His breakout book, *Crazy Love*, inspired thousands to forsake lukewarm Christianity for a life of radical devotion to Christ. He was the torchbearer many young Christians looked to—a pastor who seemed to stand on sola Scriptura, calling out sin and urging believers toward authentic faith.

But over time, something began to change.

His sermons grew quieter on truth and louder on emotion. His sharpness dulled. His once-clear stand against Catholic doctrine became foggy. He began appearing at ecumenical gatherings, hugging heretics, and praising Roman Catholic sacraments. Where there was once fire—clarity, heat, light—there now rests a heavy fog.

This essay marks the beginning of a 4-part series analyzing Chan's dangerous shift. Not because we hate him. But because **when a trusted shepherd turns toward error**, the sheep must be warned.

I. Chan's Early Clarity: A Voice Crying in the Suburbs

Francis Chan wasn't always this way.

In the early 2000s, his ministry at Cornerstone Church in Simi Valley was refreshingly biblical. He preached hell. He rebuked worldliness. He uplifted the cross. His sermons were filled with a holy urgency—like a man who really believed time was short and eternity was real.

He used the Bible unapologetically. He didn't merely sprinkle verses into self-help monologues like so many others. He taught expositionally, passionately, and often at the expense of his own popularity.

And yet—*fire without foundation eventually burns out or burns sideways.*

As we'll explore in this series, Chan's radicalism was not deeply rooted in sound doctrine, rightly divided. His emotional zeal, without doctrinal guardrails, made him susceptible to dangerous detours masked as humility, love, and unity.

II. Leaving the Pulpit: The First Shift

In 2010, Chan made a stunning announcement: he was stepping down from Cornerstone Church.

Why?

He said he felt people were “too focused on him.” He longed to “live by faith,” to be free of the celebrity pastor culture. On the surface, that sounds admirable. But his departure marked a pivot—not just from the pulpit, but from biblical boldness.

From then on, Chan began associating more with fringe movements, mystical groups, and hyper-charismatic circles. He started home churches and advocated for a more “organic” approach to Christianity. He grew increasingly critical of structured theology and began emphasizing *experience over exposition*.

The fog had started to roll in.

III. Reimagining the Church: The Mist of Mysticism

Chan’s next major move was to launch *We Are Church*, a house-church network aimed at reimagining the New Testament church. While there’s nothing wrong with house churches, Chan’s language began to reflect a growing disdain for theological precision.

He said things like:

“I used to preach messages that were too doctrinal. Now I just want people to experience God.”

That should sound alarms.

Doctrine is not optional—it is foundational. Paul told Timothy to “take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee” (1 Timothy 4:16).

By sidelining doctrine, Chan didn’t just change *how* he preached—he changed *what* he preached.

He began focusing more on communal intimacy, feelings, and perceived encounters with God—often rooted in charismatic emotionalism, not biblical exposition.

Fog.

IV. Embracing Catholic Doctrine: Unity at the Cost of Truth

Perhaps the most alarming shift in Francis Chan's ministry came in 2020 when he began **publicly embracing Roman Catholic doctrine**, particularly regarding the Eucharist.

Chan began teaching a near-Catholic view of communion, suggesting that the early Church believed in the real presence of Christ in the elements. He downplayed the Reformation, suggesting that our modern divisions are sad and unhelpful.

Worse, he began appearing at Catholic conferences, praising unity, and hugging heretical priests and speakers who deny salvation by grace through faith alone.

He said at one conference:

"I didn't know for the first 1,500 years of Church history, everyone saw [the Eucharist] as the literal body and blood of Christ... I've been reading more about it, and I'm open."

Open?

To the very doctrine the Reformers **died** rejecting?

The Bible says: "For we are sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all" (Hebrews 10:10). Christ is not re-sacrificed. The bread is not His literal flesh. This is basic biblical truth, and yet Chan has chosen fog over fire.

V. Emotional Appeals Replacing Expository Clarity

A defining trait of Chan's recent preaching is his *emotionalism*. His messages are now more about crying than clarifying. More about *feeling God* than *knowing Him through His Word*.

He preaches in broken tones, often teary-eyed, making himself appear humble and gentle. But beneath the emotional delivery is a troubling shift: **feelings have replaced facts**.

Chan even stated in one video:

"I used to think right doctrine was everything. But I've met Catholics who love Jesus more than I do. Maybe I need to learn from them."

That's not humility. That's spiritual confusion.

Right doctrine *is* everything. It is not arrogant to believe the truth—it is obedient. Chan has equated sincerity with salvation, emotion with orthodoxy, and unity with truth. That's not biblical. That's deception.

VI. The Danger of “Niceness” as Theology

One of the devil’s slickest tools in our generation is *niceness*. If someone cries, speaks softly, and doesn’t seem angry, we assume they must be Christlike.

But Jesus rebuked. Paul warned. Peter confronted heresy. Truth is not always nice—it is sharp (Hebrews 4:12).

Chan now plays the “nice guy prophet,” gently beckoning all denominations into a warm hug of unity—even if it means sacrificing doctrine.

He says things like:

“We need to stop dividing over secondary issues.”

But the *real presence* of Christ in the Eucharist is not secondary. The gospel of salvation by grace through faith is not secondary. Fellowship with darkness is not secondary.

Chan is being used to blur the lines.

Fog.

VII. The Apostle Paul vs. Francis Chan

Imagine Francis Chan debating the Apostle Paul.

Paul would thunder: “If any man preach any other gospel... let him be accursed!” (Galatians 1:9).

Chan would whisper: “But what if they’re really sincere?”

Paul would say: “Mark them which cause divisions... and avoid them” (Romans 16:17).

Chan would respond: “That feels harsh. I just want unity.”

Paul would say: “Preach the Word... reprove, rebuke, exhort” (2 Timothy 4:2).

Chan would say: “Let’s just experience God together.”

This is not a caricature. This is where we are.

VIII. Final Warning: From Fog to Fire Again?

Is Francis Chan lost forever? Only God knows. But his platform is now being used **to confuse**, not clarify. To merge truth with error. To turn fire into fog.

And millions are following him into it.

As believers, we are called to “earnestly contend for the faith” (Jude 3), not emotionally compromise for the sake of feelings. The early Church had clarity. Jesus is the Truth. His Word is the Light.

Let us not follow a man into the fog just because he once carried a torch.

If Satan can't make a man fall through sin, he'll make him fall through softness. If he can't burn him with scandal, he'll fog him with confusion.

“Now we have received... the spirit which is of God; that we might know the things that are freely given to us of God.” – 1 Corinthians 2:12 (KJV)

There's a growing trend in the modern Church—a shift from **study to sensation**, from **doctrine to feelings**, from **Scripture to inner experience**. Nowhere is this more evident than in the ministry transformation of **Francis Chan**.

Once grounded in passionate, Bible-based preaching, Chan has wandered from clarity into the murky fog of **emotional mysticism**—a subjective faith built on *how something feels*, not on what **God says**.

This essay—the second in our exposé on Francis Chan—uncovers how a beloved teacher has slowly traded the solid rock of Scripture for the shaky waves of mystical experience, leading multitudes into a version of Christianity that exalts **emotion over exegesis**, and **spiritual sensation over biblical truth**.

I. From Bible-Centered Preaching to Emotion-Driven Speaking

In his early days, Francis Chan preached with fire from the Bible. His sermons at Cornerstone Church were rooted in Scripture, often rebuking sin, calling for holiness, and urging radical faith. He emphasized **the Word**, not the **worship atmosphere**.

But today, his tone has shifted. He still references the Bible, but the emphasis has changed. He speaks in whispers. He cries often. His teaching style has become far more anecdotal and mystical than exegetical.

Statements like these are now commonplace in his messages:

“I just felt like God was saying...”

“There was a heaviness in the room that I couldn’t explain...”

“I had this sense... this impression... that God was leading me...”

These aren’t evil statements in isolation. But when this becomes the *foundation* of preaching and guidance—**rather than Scripture rightly divided**—we’ve moved into **dangerous territory**.

II. The Rise of Mysticism in the Modern Church

Mysticism in the Church is the practice of **seeking God through direct emotional experience**, often **apart from or above the written Word**.

It emphasizes:

- **Feelings as confirmations**
- **Personal revelations as superior to biblical exegesis**
- **The inner voice over the written voice of God**

This has exploded through movements like IHOP (International House of Prayer), Bethel Church, and Catholic contemplative prayer movements. Now, Francis Chan—once a defender of Scripture—is platforming, endorsing, and echoing their language and methods.

Mysticism’s core error is this: **It makes man the authority**, not God’s Word.

III. Dangerous Statements by Chan that Reveal Mystical Drift

Here are just a few examples of how Chan's words have shifted from biblical clarity to mystical subjectivity:

1. "God told me..." Statements

"I didn't plan to speak on this today, but I feel like God is telling me someone here needs to hear this..."

This common phrase is now central to Chan's ministry. But the Bible warns:

"The prophet that hath a dream, let him tell a dream; and he that hath my word, let him speak my word faithfully." – Jeremiah 23:28

There's a difference between **being Spirit-led** and speaking **as though your thoughts are divine revelation**.

2. Vague Emotional Experiences Interpreted as Divine

"There was this time I was praying, and I just felt like I was in the throne room of God. It's hard to explain..."

That might feel powerful. But it's **not authoritative**.

Paul *was* caught up into the third heaven (2 Corinthians 12), but he didn't build doctrine on it. Chan builds *entire teachings* around these feelings.

IV. The Shift Toward Catholic Contemplative Prayer

Chan has begun promoting **ancient Catholic mysticism**—particularly in the way he teaches people to "be still," "center themselves," and "experience God in silence."

This aligns with the **contemplative prayer movement**, which includes:

- Emptying the mind
- Repeating phrases (mantras)
- Silence as a spiritual gateway
- Inner awareness as divine contact

These practices are rooted not in Scripture, but in **monastic mysticism**, often borrowed from **Eastern religions** like Buddhism and Hinduism.

Jesus never taught this. The apostles never practiced this.

The Bible says:

“Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom...” – Colossians 3:16

We commune with God through **His Word and prayer**—not emptying our minds to feel His presence.

V. Emotions Are a Terrible Compass

Francis Chan frequently appeals to **how things feel**—as though spiritual truth can be confirmed by emotional response.

But Scripture teaches the opposite:

“The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?” – Jeremiah 17:9

“There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death.” – Proverbs 14:12

When you **prioritize emotion**, you open yourself to:

- **False spirits** masquerading as divine
- **Doctrinal error** confirmed by good feelings
- **Manipulation** by leaders who generate emotional highs

Francis Chan’s shift into mysticism has led him to validate **heretical movements** simply because their gatherings *felt holy*.

He once said:

“I felt the presence of God so powerfully at a Catholic event... more than most Protestant churches I’ve been in.”

“Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God...” – 1 John 4:1

Francis Chan rarely speaks of **testing spirits**, only *feeling* them.

VII. Partnership with Charismatic Mystics

Chan has shared stages with:

- **Mike Bickle (IHOPKC)**
- **Bill Johnson (Bethel Church)**
- **Todd White (prosperity healer)**

These men promote:

- Grave soaking
- Destiny declarations
- Gold dust manifestations
- “Holy laughter” and falling under “power”

Why would someone who once preached Scripture **stand beside these mystics?**

Because Chan’s theology is now **based on shared emotion**, not shared doctrine.

He no longer separates by truth. He **unites by atmosphere.**

VIII. The Apostle Paul and the Contrast of True Revelation

Paul had spiritual encounters—but he **always subordinated them to Scripture.** In fact, he warned:

“Though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel... let him be accursed.” – Galatians 1:8

Chan seems more open to new feelings than *guarding the old faith*.

Paul wrote:

“I speak as to wise men; judge ye what I say.” – 1 Corinthians 10:15

Chan now says:

“Who are we to judge someone else’s encounter with God?”

“All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction...” – 2 Timothy 3:16

Francis Chan used to preach that.

Now, he preaches **experiences, hunches, and atmospheres**.

“Can two walk together, except they be agreed?” – Amos 3:3 (KJV)

There is a growing storm on the horizon—one that threatens to blur the lines between truth and heresy, the gospel of grace and the counterfeit of works. At the heart of this storm stands a well-known voice once marked by clarity: **Francis Chan**.

In his early years, Chan was bold and biblically grounded. He preached the gospel with urgency and warned against theological error. But in recent years, he has embraced one of the most dangerous doctrinal compromises of our time: **a move toward Roman Catholic Eucharistic theology in the name of unity**.

What once was called out as heresy is now being praised as holiness. And Chan is leading the charge.

This exposé will break down how Francis Chan has shifted from gospel-centered clarity to sacramental confusion, replacing biblical conviction with ecumenical compromise. The goal? A false unity that flatters Rome but betrays Christ.

I. What Is the Catholic Doctrine of the Eucharist?

To understand the error Chan is embracing, we must first understand **what Rome teaches**.

The Bible is clear: **Christ’s sacrifice was once for all**. It is not repeated, re-offered, or re-presented. The Lord’s Supper is a **memorial** (1 Corinthians 11:24–26), not a mystical transformation of substance.

II. Francis Chan's Alarming Shift

In 2020, Francis Chan began to publicly promote a **sacramental view of the Eucharist**, stating:

“For the first 1,500 years of Church history, everyone saw the Lord’s Supper as the literal body and blood of Christ.”

That is **factually and historically incorrect**. The early Church had **diverse views** on the Lord’s Supper, but the formal doctrine of transubstantiation wasn’t codified until the **Fourth Lateran Council in 1215 A.D.**

Chan also said:

Francis Chan is no longer warning against false gospels—he’s **embracing them in the name of unity**.

He is building **doctrinal bridges where God has placed walls.**

IV. The Eucharist vs. The Finished Work of Christ

Let's be crystal clear.

The Catholic Mass says:

- Christ is **offered again** in an unbloody sacrifice

Francis Chan's embrace of Eucharistic language muddies this distinction. He says:

But that experience does not validate the theology. We do not test doctrine by how it makes us feel—we test it by the Word of God.

V. Why This Matters: The Gospel Is at Stake

Francis Chan's move toward Roman Eucharistic theology is not merely a “secondary issue.” It strikes at the very heart of the gospel.

Rome teaches:

- Salvation is a **process**, not a finished work

These are **gospel-denying doctrines**.

“I do not frustrate the grace of God: for if righteousness come by the law, then Christ is dead in vain.” – Galatians 2:21

VI. The Emotional Manipulation of "Unity"

We are not commanded to **unite with heresy**—we are commanded to **separate from it.**

Jesus said:

“I came not to send peace, but a sword.” – Matthew 10:34

When Francis Chan hugs a false gospel for the sake of peace, he is **betraying Christ’s warning.**

VII. The Influence of Rome on Chan's Language

Chan’s recent language mirrors Catholic terminology:

- “Real presence”
- “Sacred mystery”
- “The beauty of the Eucharist”
- “Sacramental grace”

These are not neutral phrases. They are loaded with Roman Catholic doctrine.

Even his tone has changed. He no longer boldly proclaims sola Scriptura or justification by faith alone. Instead, he speaks in **foggy, mystical terms**, honoring Catholic mystics and priests.

He once stated:

And **you are affirming it**.

VIII. The Apostle Paul vs. the Sacramental System

If Paul were here, he would not share a platform with those who preach another gospel.

He would cry:

“O foolish Galatians, who hath bewitched you...?” – Galatians 3:1

Paul would see the Eucharist as Rome defines it and say:

“Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free...” – Galatians 5:1

He wouldn’t sip wine next to a priest in robes.

He would **rebuke the system** and call men to repentance.

But Chan fellowships with them in front of thousands, saying:

“I feel the presence of God in their worship.”

The early Reformers would’ve called that betrayal. So should we.

IX. The True Lord’s Supper: A Memorial of Grace

The biblical Lord’s Supper is:

- A **remembrance** of Christ’s sacrifice (Luke 22:19)

- A **proclamation** of the gospel (1 Corinthians 11:26)
- A **symbolic ordinance**, not a sacrament of grace
- Open only to **born-again believers**

It is not mystical. It is meaningful.

It doesn't **dispense grace**—it reminds us of the grace we already have through faith.

Francis Chan's promotion of a mystical Eucharist perverts the purpose of the table.

It is not an altar—it's a **memorial**.

X. Final Warning: Unity Without Truth Is Apostasy

Francis Chan has built a bridge to Rome that **the Bible does not sanction**. In doing so, he has placed **unity above doctrine, emotion above gospel, and experience above Scripture**.

This is not revival—it's regression.

“If there come any unto you, and bring not this doctrine, receive him not...” – 2 John 10

Chan receives them. Praises them. Promotes them.

But Jesus said:

“In vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men.” – Matthew 15:9

If Chan continues down this road, he will not merely blur lines—**he will lead others into the arms of a false gospel**.

Conclusion: The Supper or the Snare?

What was meant to be a memorial of the **finished work of Christ** is being turned into a **snare of sacramentalism**, and Francis Chan is at the center of the confusion.

He is misleading the Church with emotionalism, ecumenism, and half-truths.

This isn't a small disagreement.

It is a **clash between grace and works, faith and ritual, truth and error**.

The cross is either enough—or it's not.
The Word is either sufficient—or it's not.

Francis Chan has chosen experience over exposition.
And his Eucharistic errors are proof that **unity without truth is treason**.

4 of 4: Francis Chan Exposed – When Humility Hides Heresy

“For they that are such serve not our Lord Jesus Christ, but their own belly; and by good words and fair speeches deceive the hearts of the simple.” – Romans 16:18 (KJV)

Francis Chan has mastered the art of appearing humble.

He speaks with trembling lips. He avoids confrontation. He cries as he preaches. He rarely raises his voice. He often opens his sermons with self-effacing remarks about how unworthy he feels to speak at all.

And yet, beneath the surface of this “gentle spirit” lies a devastating pattern:

He affirms heretics. He embraces false gospels. He platform-shares with wolves. And he calls it humility.

This final essay in the *Francis Chan Exposed* series will uncover the most subtle and dangerous shift of all—**the use of false humility to justify doctrinal compromise**. In the name of love, Chan has embraced deception. In the name of unity, he has forsaken truth. And in the name of humility, he has concealed heresy beneath a soft smile.

I. The Humble Façade

Francis Chan consistently presents himself as broken and unworthy. At first glance, this seems admirable. After all, Scripture tells us:

“God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble.” – James 4:6

But humility, like any virtue, can be **weaponized** when divorced from truth.

Here's what we've observed from Chan's pattern:

- He refuses to **call out false doctrine**, even when asked directly.
- He shares platforms with dangerous teachers, while sidestepping clear theological differences.
- He responds to criticism with **emotional appeals**, not Scripture.

This isn't biblical humility. It's a **cloak for compromise**.

II. Appearing Gentle While Affirming Heresy

One of the most troubling aspects of Chan's recent ministry is his **refusal to make distinctions** between biblical truth and damnable heresy.

He has shared stages with:

- **Mike Bickle** – Charismatic leader linked to serious spiritual abuse allegations and extrabiblical revelations.
- **Todd White** – A prosperity preacher known for fake healings and “leg-lengthening” stunts.
- **Roman Catholic priests** – Who teach salvation through sacraments and veneration of Mary.

When asked why he shares platforms with such figures, Chan often responds:

“Who am I to judge what God is doing in someone else?”

That sounds humble. But it's a **complete abandonment of biblical discernment**.

“Them that sin rebuke before all, that others also may fear.” – 1 Timothy 5:20

“Try the spirits whether they are of God...” – 1 John 4:1

“Mark them which cause divisions and offenses contrary to the doctrine which ye have learned; and avoid them.” – Romans 16:17

There is a **time to be gentle**. But there is also a time to **stand boldly for truth**.

III. The False Virtue of “Don't Judge”

A common thread in Chan's teaching is his discomfort with making theological judgments. He often says things like:

“We need to stop dividing over doctrine.”

“God is bigger than our understanding.”

“I’m not sure I’m right—I just love Jesus.”

But this is not biblical humility. It’s **spiritual cowardice**.

Paul told Titus:

“A man that is an heretick after the first and second admonition reject.” – Titus 3:10

Jesus Himself warned of **false prophets** in Matthew 7. The apostles wrote entire letters correcting doctrine. Jude tells us to **earnestly contend** for the faith (Jude 3).

Francis Chan has rebranded that command as prideful arrogance. In his eyes, those who draw lines are divisive—but those who blur lines are loving.

That’s not humility. That’s betrayal.

IV. When Tears Replace Truth

Chan’s sermons have grown increasingly emotional. He cries frequently. He breaks mid-sentence. He laments over Church division.

But tears are not the measure of truth.

The prophets wept too—but they **rebuked sin**. Jesus wept—but He also **cleansed the temple with a whip**. Paul wept—but he **named names** (2 Timothy 2:17).

Chan’s emotionalism has become a **disarming tactic**. It allows him to stand beside heretics and make it seem holy—because who could criticize someone so sincere?

But sincerity does not sanctify error.

“There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death.”
– Proverbs 14:12

V. The Weaponization of Meekness

Jesus said:

“Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth.” – Matthew 5:5

But meekness is **not weakness**. It’s **power under control**, not power abandoned.

Paul rebuked Peter publicly (Galatians 2:11–14).

Jesus rebuked the Pharisees to their faces (Matthew 23).

John wrote with thunder against false teachers (1 John).

Chan uses “meekness” as a shield—to **avoid confrontation, downplay doctrinal clarity, and cozy up to compromise.**

When asked about doctrinal disagreements, he shrugs. When asked about Roman Catholicism, he praises their passion.

That’s not Christlike. That’s *passive spiritual sabotage.*

VI. The High Cost of Avoiding Offense

Chan once said:

“I just don’t want to push people away by being divisive.”

But the gospel **is** offensive.

“For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness...” – 1 Corinthians 1:18

Truth divides. Jesus said it would (Luke 12:51). He said He would set a man against his father, and daughter against mother.

You cannot **soften the gospel** without **surrendering it.**

Francis Chan has made “not offending anyone” a higher virtue than **contending for truth.** But avoiding offense **has led him to affirm error.**

VII. Confusion as a Badge of Honor

Another red flag is how Chan now celebrates theological confusion as humility.

He often says things like:

“I used to be so sure... now I’m just trying to love Jesus and listen.”

This sounds humble—but it’s **crippling spiritual leadership.**

Paul was sure. Peter was sure. John was sure. The apostles didn’t lead with confusion—they led with **conviction.**

To say, “I don’t know who’s right,” when faced with Rome’s false gospel, is not humility—it’s **irresponsibility**.

“But speak thou the things which become sound doctrine.” – Titus 2:1

VIII. Rewriting the Example of Christ

Chan often says:

“Jesus just loved people. He didn’t make people feel wrong. He welcomed everyone.”

This is the **new false Christ** of emotional mysticism.

The real Jesus:

- Called people “children of the devil” (John 8:44)
- Warned of hell repeatedly
- Rebuked entire cities (Matthew 11:21–24)
- Drove out the money changers with a whip

Love without truth is **not love**.

Humility without courage is **not Christlike**.

Francis Chan has crafted a Jesus that suits his passive theology. But that Jesus **does not save**.

IX. What True Humility Looks Like

True humility is:

- Bowing to the authority of Scripture
- Confessing Christ boldly, regardless of cost
- Submitting to the gospel, not feelings
- Being willing to be hated for the truth

Francis Chan’s “humility” often involves:

- Affirming heretics
- Dodging theological clarity

- Prioritizing relationships over repentance
- Speaking ambiguously to please both sides

This is not humility. This is **fear disguised as virtue**.

X. The Danger to the Body of Christ

Chan's influence is vast—especially among young believers who value sincerity over substance.

And that's exactly what makes him dangerous.

He is:

- Sincere, but unbiblical
- Soft-spoken, but spiritually compromising
- Emotionally moving, but doctrinally vague
- United with heretics, but silent on repentance

He creates the impression of godliness while allowing **doctrinal poison** to spread unchallenged.

“Having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof: from such turn away.” – 2 Timothy 3:5

Conclusion: Don't Confuse Kindness with Compromise

Francis Chan may mean well. He may sincerely believe he's promoting unity and love. But **sincerity cannot save you from false teaching**.

Jesus said:

“If the blind lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch.” – Matthew 15:14

Chan has allowed his “humility” to blind his discernment.

And worse—he's blinding others.

The Church does not need men who cry over unity while sharing pulpits with heretics. The Church needs men who **stand for truth, speak with clarity, and love without compromising**.

“Be not deceived: evil communications corrupt good manners.” – 1 Corinthians 15:33
