## **1 of 10: Persia & Iran: From Prophecy to Power – The Rise of Persia: God's Hand in a Pagan Empire**

*(Isaiah 44:28–45:1 | Daniel 5:28)*

**Theme: God moves kings like pawns.**

### **Introduction: A Pagan Power in the Palm of God's Hand**

Long before Iran became the radical regime we know today, long before Islam or modern politics, **Persia** was a mighty empire that unknowingly fulfilled the will of God. This empire, which corresponds to modern-day Iran, **rose to global dominance not by accident—but by divine design.**

In this essay, we're going to peel back the layers of time and see how **God raised up a pagan king named Cyrus**, foretold his name over a century in advance, and used the rising Persian Empire to bring judgment, restoration, and prophecy to fulfillment. This isn't just ancient history—it's a **living testimony** that **God rules in the kingdoms of men** (Daniel 4:17).

### **The Biblical Setup: A Kingdom Waiting to Rise**

To understand Persia's rise, we must first understand the **fall of Babylon**. By the time we reach Daniel chapter 5, Babylon had already reached its height under Nebuchadnezzar. His successors, especially **Belshazzar**, had grown careless, proud, and spiritually blind.

That's where **Daniel 5:28** comes in—when the “handwriting on the wall” appears, God declares judgment:

“PERES; Thy kingdom is divided, and given to the Medes and Persians.”

— *Daniel 5:28*

That's the moment Persia steps onto the biblical stage.

### **The Prophetic Setup: God Names a Pagan King**

But here's the jaw-dropper—**God foretold all of this before it ever happened**, and even **called Cyrus by name** *before the man was born*.

“That saith of Cyrus, He is my shepherd, and shall perform all my pleasure: even saying to Jerusalem, Thou shalt be built; and to the temple, Thy foundation shall be laid.”

— *Isaiah 44:28*

“Thus saith the Lord to his anointed, to Cyrus, whose right hand I have holden...”

— *Isaiah 45:1*

These verses were written **more than 100 years before Cyrus came to power**. Isaiah lived during the reign of Hezekiah (8th century BC), while Cyrus conquered Babylon in **539 BC**.

Let that sink in.

God didn't just say “*a man will come*.” He said:

- His **name** will be Cyrus.
- He will be **anointed** (even though he's a Gentile).
- He will give the command to **rebuild Jerusalem** and **lay the temple's foundation**.

There's no wiggle room here. **Only the God who declares the end from the beginning (Isaiah 46:10)** could make such a precise declaration and bring it to pass.

## **Persia's Rise: A Force the World Couldn't Stop**

Persia didn't rise with noise and chaos—it rose with **strategy, diplomacy, and power**.

### **Origin and Expansion**

The Persian Empire began as a **vassal state under the Medes**. But Cyrus the Great **overthrew his Median overlords** and united the Medes and Persians into one empire—forming the foundation of what would become the **Achaemenid Empire**.

He conquered:

- **Lydia** in Asia Minor (modern-day Turkey)
- **Babylon** (the mighty power of the age)
- And ultimately built an empire that stretched from **India to Ethiopia**.

But for our purposes, **Babylon's fall is the key moment** where biblical prophecy collides with political history.

## The Fall of Babylon – Fulfilling the Word of the Lord

Daniel 5 records the drunken feast of Belshazzar, where sacred temple vessels were mocked—and judgment came like lightning.

What they didn't know was that **Cyrus' army was already at the gates**, but not in the usual way. Cyrus used a brilliant strategy:

- He **diverted the Euphrates River**, lowering the water level.
- His soldiers **waded under the city gates**, which were left unguarded due to the false sense of security inside the palace.
- **That very night**, Babylon fell—just as **Daniel had interpreted**.

“In that night was Belshazzar the king of the Chaldeans slain.  
And Darius the Median took the kingdom...”

— *Daniel 5:30–31*

And thus, the **Medo-Persian Empire** took its place in biblical history.

But what makes this more than a military conquest is what Cyrus did **after** the victory.

## The Decree to Rebuild – Persia as God's Tool

Ezra 1:1–2 records something almost unthinkable:

“Now in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia... the Lord stirred up the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia, that he made a proclamation throughout all his kingdom...

Thus saith Cyrus king of Persia, The Lord God of heaven hath given me all the kingdoms of the earth; and he hath charged me to build him an house at Jerusalem...”

Let's pause here.

Cyrus, a **pagan king**, who was **never part of Israel**, suddenly acknowledges:

- The **God of heaven**,
- That **He gave him power**, and
- That **He charged him** to rebuild the Jewish temple.

This is **not normal** behavior for pagan kings. This isn't mere diplomacy—it's **divine orchestration**. Isaiah had foretold it. Daniel likely showed Cyrus the prophecy in Isaiah. And Cyrus responded—with obedience.

He gave the Jews permission, protection, and funding to return to Jerusalem and rebuild the temple. He even **returned the sacred vessels** Nebuchadnezzar had stolen (Ezra 1:7–11).

The rise of Persia didn't just fulfill prophecy—it became the means of **Israel's restoration**.

### **Application: God Moves Kings Like Pawns**

So what can we take from this today?

#### **1. God knows the future before it begins.**

He called Cyrus by name. That's not metaphorical—it's literal.

No regime rises without God's knowledge. No leader catches Him off guard.

#### **2. God can use anyone—saved or unsaved—for His purposes.**

Cyrus didn't grow up reading the Torah. He wasn't in covenant. But God **called him "my shepherd"** and even "my anointed."

That tells us: **God is not limited by our assumptions of who He can use.**

#### **3. World empires are chess pieces on God's board.**

From Babylon to Persia, from Rome to today's powers—God sets up and removes kings (Daniel 2:21).

Even now, as Iran (Persia) seeks power through nuclear weapons and terrorism, **we must remember that God's hand has always been above Persia—and still is.**

### **Persia and Prophecy: Setting the Stage for the Future**

Though this essay focuses on Persia's rise, it's important to note that **this empire continues to echo through biblical prophecy:**

- Persia's assistance to the Jews paved the way for the rebuilding of the temple.
- That temple would eventually be visited by **Jesus Christ Himself**, who declared it His Father's house.

- Persia’s ancient favor will one day turn to **end-time hostility**, as seen in Ezekiel 38–39, where **Persia joins Gog and Magog in an invasion of Israel**.

This prophetic arc—from **instrument of deliverance to instrument of judgment**—shows the full range of how God can use a nation.

### **Devotional Reflection: Trusting God When Kings Rise**

We’re living in a time when world leaders make reckless decisions. Regimes rise that appear godless, violent, and chaotic. It’s easy to feel fear—or even despair.

But this study reminds us:

- God isn’t just watching—**He’s directing**.
- He used Persia to bring His people home.
- He used Cyrus to rebuild His house.
- He toppled Babylon in one night when their arrogance crossed a line.

If He did all that, **do you think He’s wringing His hands over modern Iran, Russia, or China?**

No. He is **King of kings and Lord of lords** (Revelation 19:16).

### **Conclusion: The God Who Calls Kings by Name**

Persia’s rise is not just a tale of military conquest—it’s a **story of divine authorship**. God wrote Cyrus into the story before Cyrus ever breathed his first breath.

That’s how sovereign God is.

As we continue through this series, remember: **modern-day Iran is still under the watchful hand of the same God who raised up ancient Persia**. They may plot, they may rage, but **God’s purposes will prevail**.

“The Lord hath made all things for himself: yea, even the wicked for the day of evil.”  
— *Proverbs 16:4*

And so, we watch the news not in panic, but in **prophetic awareness**—knowing the God who wrote the end from the beginning **still holds the pen**.

## **2 of 10: Persia & Iran: From Prophecy to Power – Cyrus the Anointed: When a Persian King Freed God’s People**

*(Ezra 1:1–4 | Isaiah 45:1–13)*

**Theme: God can use anyone, even those who don’t know Him.**

### **Introduction: The King Who Didn’t Know God... But Obeyed Him**

When people think of Bible heroes, they think of Abraham, Moses, David, and Paul. Few would put **Cyrus the Great**, the king of Persia, on that list. And yet—**God does**.

The Lord not only used this Gentile king to deliver His people, He called him something astonishing:

“He is **My shepherd**... He is **My anointed**.”

*(Isaiah 44:28 – 45:1)*

Cyrus was not born into the lineage of Israel. He didn’t know the Law. He never entered the temple. And yet **God chose him, empowered him, and fulfilled prophecy through him**—long before the man even knew who God was.

This essay will walk through **the decree of Cyrus to rebuild Jerusalem**, explore why God called him “My shepherd,” and offer a clear application for every believer today:

**God can use anyone, even those who don’t know Him.**

### **Prophecy Before the Man: The Miracle of Isaiah’s Prediction**

Let’s begin with one of the **most jaw-dropping prophecies** in the entire Bible.

Roughly **150 years before Cyrus was born**, the prophet Isaiah declared:

“That saith of **Cyrus**, He is my shepherd, and shall perform all my pleasure: even saying to Jerusalem, Thou shalt be built; and to the temple, Thy foundation shall be laid.”

*(Isaiah 44:28)*

And then again in Isaiah 45:1:

“Thus saith the Lord to His **anointed**, to Cyrus, whose right hand I have holden...”

Let that sink in.

- **Isaiah calls him by name**—before his parents, grandparents, or empire ever existed.

- **God calls him “anointed”**—a title rarely given outside of Israel.
- And the Lord says Cyrus will **rebuild Jerusalem** and **lay the temple’s foundation**—long before Babylon ever destroyed it.

This isn’t vague prophecy—it’s **specific, predictive, and historical**. It would be like someone in the 1800s writing down the name of a president and what he’d do in 2025—**and getting it right**.

Only God can do that.

### **Historical Fulfillment: Cyrus Takes Babylon**

Fast-forward to **539 BC**. The Persian Empire, under **Cyrus the Great**, conquers the mighty city of Babylon. As we discussed in Essay 1, this was the moment God shifted world power into Persian hands—and that set the stage for prophecy to be fulfilled.

The Jews had been in exile in Babylon for **70 years**, just as Jeremiah had prophesied (Jer. 25:11–12). Many thought the dream of returning to Jerusalem was over. The temple had been destroyed. Jerusalem’s walls were in ruins. The people had become accustomed to life in a foreign land.

But God wasn’t finished.

He had a **king in the wings**. And that king was **Cyrus**.

### **Ezra 1:1–4 – The Decree That Changed Everything**

“Now in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, that the word of the Lord by the mouth of Jeremiah might be fulfilled, the Lord stirred up the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia...”

*(Ezra 1:1)*

God *stirred* his spirit.

This pagan ruler, likely unfamiliar with Jewish prophecy, suddenly becomes **a vessel of divine deliverance**. The decree he makes is nothing short of astounding:

“The Lord God of heaven hath given me all the kingdoms of the earth; and He hath charged me to build Him an house at Jerusalem...”

*(Ezra 1:2)*

Let’s stop right there.

Cyrus:

- **Acknowledges the God of heaven** (not Marduk, Baal, or Ahura Mazda).
- Attributes his **success to the God of Israel**.
- And claims a **direct commission to rebuild the temple** in Jerusalem.

Not only that, he **funds the journey, restores the temple vessels, and commands anyone willing to help** (Ezra 1:4).

This wasn't politics.

This was **prophecy in motion**.

### **“My Shepherd” – Why Would God Use a Pagan King?**

In Isaiah 44:28, God calls Cyrus **“My shepherd.”**

That term isn't used lightly. It's how God refers to:

- Moses (Psalm 77:20)
- David (Psalm 78:70–72)
- The Messiah (John 10:11)

Why would God give that same title to Cyrus?

Because **Cyrus performed a shepherd's function**—he **led the flock of Israel out of captivity**, just as Moses had done in Egypt.

God didn't choose Cyrus because he was righteous. He didn't pick him because he followed the law. He used him **because Cyrus would do exactly what God wanted done**.

“He shall perform all My pleasure...” (*Isaiah 44:28*)

God didn't need Cyrus to understand everything—He just needed him to **obey the stirring in his spirit**.

And he did.

### **Isaiah 45:1–13 – The Anointed One**

In Isaiah 45, God doubles down:

“Thus saith the Lord to His anointed, to Cyrus...”

This is the only time in Scripture where a **Gentile king** is referred to as “anointed.” In Hebrew, this is “**Messiah**” (**mashiach**)—the same word used for David, priests, and even Jesus Christ.

Now, this doesn’t mean Cyrus was sinless or divine. It means **he was chosen, appointed, and set apart** for a mission.

God declares:

- “I will go before thee...” (v. 2)
- “I will break in pieces the gates of brass...” (v. 2)
- “I will give thee the treasures of darkness...” (v. 3)
- “That thou mayest know that I, the Lord, which call thee by thy name, am the God of Israel.” (v. 3)

And in verse 4:

“For Jacob my servant’s sake, and Israel mine elect, I have even called thee by thy name: **I have surnamed thee, though thou hast not known Me.**”

This is the key.

Cyrus didn’t know God.

He didn’t grow up in covenant.

But he was still **God’s chosen vessel**.

### **Application: God Can Use Anyone—Even Those Who Don’t Know Him**

This is where the text hits home.

We often assume that God can only work through preachers, pastors, prophets, or believers.

But Cyrus shatters that box.

**God can use a politician.**

**God can use an unbeliever.**

**God can use a king, a general, a president—even if they don’t know Him yet.**

The question isn't, "Does this person know God?"

The real question is, "Is God stirring their spirit for His purpose?"

Cyrus was used:

- To **liberate a people,**
- To **fund the rebuilding of God's house,**
- And to **fulfill prophecy in exact detail.**

If God could do that through a pagan king, how much more can He do through **us**, who know Him?

## Lessons for Today

### 1. Don't limit who God can use.

The church has a habit of labeling people "usable" or "unusable." But God never asked for our approval. He raised up Pharaoh to show His power (Rom. 9:17). He raised up Nebuchadnezzar to judge Israel. And He raised up Cyrus to rebuild.

### 2. Look for God's hand in unexpected places.

Cyrus wasn't a rabbi or prophet. He was a conqueror. And yet **God moved through the political and military arena to fulfill a spiritual purpose.** That should make us pay attention to what God is doing today—even through unexpected leaders.

### 3. When God stirs your spirit—respond.

Cyrus didn't ignore the stirring. He didn't suppress the call. He acted—and his obedience changed history. If you sense the Lord nudging you, **don't wait.** You may not see the full picture, but He does.

## A Prophetic Glimpse: Echoes of Christ in Cyrus

There's another layer here—**Cyrus is a type of Christ.**

- He **delivers captives** from bondage.
- He **restores the temple.**
- He is **called "anointed."**

- He is **named before birth**.
- He **overthrows Babylon**, just as Christ will overthrow Mystery Babylon in Revelation.

This is not accidental. It's a shadow of a greater deliverer. Cyrus played his role in redemptive history. But **Jesus is the fulfillment** of what Cyrus only symbolized.

“The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me... to proclaim liberty to the captives...” (*Luke 4:18*)

Cyrus opened the way to rebuild the house.

Jesus became the **foundation stone** of a better house—**the church**.

### **Conclusion: From a Pagan Throne to Prophetic Fulfillment**

Cyrus never walked into the Holy of Holies.

He never sang the Psalms of David.

He never studied under a rabbi or offered a lamb on the altar.

**But he was God's anointed instrument.**

He set the captives free.

He financed the rebuilding of God's house.

He fulfilled prophecy with precision—and **proved that God's Word does not fail**.

So what does that mean for us?

It means we should never doubt who God can use.

It means that **the plans of God will not be stopped**, even if they come from unexpected places.

It means that when we read the headlines—about Iran, Persia, leaders, wars, or kings—we remember:

**God still calls, still stirs, still directs... even those who don't yet know Him.**

Let Cyrus remind you:

**It's not about your pedigree. It's about your purpose.**

If God can call a Persian king by name, He knows your name too.

### **3 of 10: Persia & Iran: From Prophecy to Power – Darius the Organizer: Order, Decrees, and the Lion’s Den**

*(Daniel 6 | Ezra 6:1–12)*

**Theme: Earthly law is limited; God overrules.**

#### **Introduction: When Earthly Power Meets Eternal Purpose**

The name **Darius** might not inspire as much awe as Cyrus or as much fear as Xerxes, but his role in biblical history is absolutely critical. Darius was not a visionary conqueror like Cyrus, but rather a powerful **administrator**, an **organizer**, and a **preserver**—a king who was instrumental in both **upholding justice** and **unwittingly challenging God's authority**.

He’s remembered in two key ways:

1. **In Daniel 6**, where he is trapped by corrupt officials and forced by the unchangeable law of the Medes and Persians to throw Daniel into the lion’s den.
2. **In Ezra 6**, where he confirms and funds the continuation of the temple's reconstruction, despite opposition.

These events reflect a major biblical truth:

**Human governments are flawed and limited—but God's will is unstoppable.**

This essay will explore how Darius maintained order, upheld decrees, and ultimately **testified to God's supremacy**, even through political tension and spiritual warfare.

#### **Part 1: Who Was Darius?**

Historically speaking, the title “Darius” may refer to more than one Persian ruler in Scripture, but in the context of Daniel 6 and Ezra 6, most scholars identify this Darius as **Darius I Hystaspes**, the third king of the Achaemenid Empire, who ruled from **522–486 BC**.

He was known for:

- Reforming the empire’s administration into **satrapies** (provinces),
- Standardizing currency and taxation,
- And launching major infrastructure projects like roads and canals.

But in the Bible, **Darius isn’t remembered for innovation—he’s remembered for a lion’s den.**

## Part 2: Daniel 6 – The Law of the Medes and Persians

Daniel, now an old man (likely in his 80s), has survived multiple kings and empires. But under Darius, he is appointed as one of the top three presidents over the 120 princes of the realm (Daniel 6:1–2).

“Then this Daniel was preferred above the presidents and princes... because an excellent spirit was in him.”

*(Daniel 6:3)*

This favor sparks **jealousy** among the other leaders. But Daniel’s life is so blameless that they realize the only way to trap him is through **his faith**.

So they set a trap:

“All the presidents of the kingdom... have consulted together to establish a royal statute... that whosoever shall ask a petition of any God or man for thirty days, save of thee, O king, he shall be cast into the den of lions.”

*(Daniel 6:7)*

And Darius, not realizing the scheme, **signs the decree**.

### The Law That Cannot Be Broken

The “**law of the Medes and Persians**” was a legal system that emphasized **irrevocability**. Once a law was signed by the king, **not even the king could reverse it**.

This concept reappears in the Book of Esther as well, where King Ahasuerus cannot revoke a decree to kill the Jews—but can only issue a counter-decree (Esther 8:8).

Darius is now **trapped by his own decree**.

When he finds out Daniel is the target, **he’s grieved**:

“Then the king, when he heard these words, was sore displeased with himself, and set his heart on Daniel to deliver him...”

*(Daniel 6:14)*

But **he cannot undo it**. And so, Daniel is cast into the den.

### God Overrides the Law

The next morning, Darius runs to the den:

“O Daniel, servant of the living God, is thy God... able to deliver thee from the lions?”  
(*Daniel 6:20*)

And Daniel answers:

“My God hath sent his angel, and hath shut the lions’ mouths...”  
(*Daniel 6:22*)

Darius is stunned—and then **furious at the conspirators**. He orders them and their families thrown into the same den, where the lions immediately devour them (*Daniel 6:24*).

What follows is perhaps one of the **greatest public decrees** of any Gentile king in Scripture:

“I make a decree, That in every dominion of my kingdom men tremble and fear before the God of Daniel...”  
(*Daniel 6:26*)

Let that resonate.

From the **lion’s den came revival**. From the mouth of a Persian king came **praise for the God of Israel**.

### **Part 3: Ezra 6 – Darius and the Temple**

While *Daniel 6* showed Darius acting under legal pressure, *Ezra 6* shows him acting with **divine favor**.

Decades after Cyrus issued his decree to rebuild the temple (*Ezra 1*), the work had stalled. Adversaries accused the Jews of rebellion and appealed to Darius, hoping he’d halt the project.

Instead, Darius **launches an investigation**:

“Then Darius the king made a decree, and search was made in the house of the rolls...”  
(*Ezra 6:1*)

They find the scroll containing **Cyrus’s original decree**. And Darius responds not by canceling it—but by **doubling down**.

“Let the house be builded... and let the expenses be given out of the king’s house.”  
(*Ezra 6:8*)

Even more amazing:

- He orders **tax revenue** from the region to fund the temple.
- He provides **daily animals, wheat, salt, wine, and oil** for offerings (Ezra 6:9).
- And he warns: anyone who opposes this work will be **executed** and have their house destroyed (Ezra 6:11).

The same man who was bound by Medo-Persian law in Daniel 6 now becomes the **protector of Israel's temple** in Ezra 6.

### **Spiritual Application: Earthly Law is Limited, but God Overrides**

Let's step back and apply this.

#### **1. Earthly law has limits.**

Even the most powerful king in the world was powerless to undo his own decree. That's a sobering reminder that **human law is not sovereign**.

Governments may write unjust laws.

Leaders may be manipulated.

Courts may make rulings that defy God's truth.

But **none of these are above God**.

#### **2. God can shut the mouths of lions.**

No matter how severe the penalty or how dire the situation, **God is still able to deliver**. He can override law, stop mouths, shift political winds, and rescue His people.

"The king's heart is in the hand of the Lord..."

*(Proverbs 21:1)*

#### **3. God honors faithfulness, even when it costs us everything.**

Daniel didn't protest, hide, or compromise. He prayed **openly**, knowing it could cost his life.

And because of that, God showed up **openly**.

### **Darius in Prophetic Perspective**

There's something else to consider: **Darius is a type of the flawed but reformable ruler.** He's no Cyrus—chosen before birth—but he **learns through experience.**

- He signs a decree in ignorance, then regrets it.
- He protects Daniel afterward and promotes God.
- He supports the temple's rebuilding, unlike future rulers who would oppose it.

This reflects how **God works through governments:**

- Some like Cyrus are used with purpose from the start.
- Others like Darius **stumble into obedience**, but still become part of God's plan.

### **Devotional Reflection: Are You a Daniel or a Darius?**

This passage challenges us to reflect:

- **Are you like Daniel?**  
Faithful even when laws are unjust? Willing to suffer rather than bow?
- **Or are you like Darius?**  
Trying to do right, but sometimes caught in the trap of men's agendas? Learning to fear the Lord through humbling circumstances?

Both men are honored in Scripture. But **only one knew the lions would be silent before going in.** And **only one prayed even when it could cost him his life.**

### **Conclusion: The God Who Rules Over Decrees**

Darius's story may be brief, but its message is eternal:

- **God overrules governments.**
- **God delivers the faithful.**
- **God causes kings to protect His work, even when they don't realize it.**

From the lion's den to the temple mount, God's fingerprints are all over the reign of Darius. He used this "organizer king" to preserve His people, protect His servant, and provide for His house.

So next time the world says:

- “The law is the law.”
- “The system can’t be changed.”
- “You can’t go against this decree.”

Remember Daniel.

And remember Darius.

Because when the lions are roaring, and the laws are unbreakable, **there’s still a throne above every earthly throne.**

And that throne **never makes a mistake.**

#### **4 of 10: Persia & Iran: From Prophecy to Power – Xerxes (Ahasuerus): Persia in the Book of Esther**

*(Book of Esther)*

**Theme: When God seems silent, He’s still in control.**

#### **Introduction: The Invisible Hand in a Visible Crisis**

The Book of Esther is unlike any other book in the Bible. It contains **no mention of God’s name**, no visions, no angels, no miracles, no prophets, no fire from heaven—**only providence**. Set in the mighty Persian Empire during the reign of King **Ahasuerus**, also known historically as **Xerxes I**, it is a story of plots and counterplots, political power plays, and a people on the brink of annihilation.

Yet beneath the surface of royal intrigue and courtroom drama lies **the unmistakable hand of God**. Not announced, but active. Not shouted, but sovereign.

Through the rise of **Esther**, the courage of **Mordecai**, and the downfall of **Haman**, God preserves His covenant people through **Persian authority**—in silence. And this silence becomes the sermon: **even when God seems absent, He is never inactive.**

This essay will explore how the Persian court becomes the unlikely setting for one of Israel’s greatest deliverances, and how Xerxes, though flawed and foolish in many ways, is used by God to preserve a people through whom the Messiah would eventually come.

## Historical Context: Who Was Xerxes?

Xerxes I, called **Ahasuerus** in the Book of Esther, ruled the Persian Empire from **486–465 BC**. He was the son of **Darius I** (see previous essay) and succeeded him as king. His reign is historically marked by:

- The failed invasion of Greece (including the famous Battle of Thermopylae),
- Massive building projects,
- And a court known for its splendor and extravagance.

By the time of the events in Esther, the Persian Empire stretched from **India to Ethiopia**, encompassing 127 provinces (Esther 1:1). It was, at that time, the **largest empire the world had ever seen**.

It is within this sprawling, multicultural empire that God sets the stage for **a hidden war of extermination—and an unexpected deliverance**.

## Chapter 1–2: A Royal Crisis and a Jewish Queen

The story begins with Xerxes hosting a **lavish, 180-day feast** to display his wealth and power. At the climax, he demands his queen, **Vashti**, appear before the guests. She refuses, and Xerxes, enraged and likely influenced by his advisors, **deposes her**.

“What shall we do unto the queen Vashti according to law...?”

*(Esther 1:15)*

This sets the stage for the rise of **Esther**, a Jewish girl living in Susa under the care of her cousin **Mordecai**. When the king later seeks a new queen, Esther is chosen in a royal contest—not because of her lineage or religious background, but because she **pleased the king** (Esther 2:17).

She keeps her Jewish identity secret on Mordecai’s advice.

At first glance, this looks like a typical palace story: beauty, romance, and intrigue. But behind it is something much bigger. Esther is placed in the palace **before the crisis comes**—a pattern seen elsewhere in Scripture. Joseph was promoted before famine. Moses was drawn from the water before the slaughter of the infants. God always places the solution **before the problem appears**.

Esther is no accident. She is **positioned by providence**.

### Chapter 3: Haman's Hatred and the Decree of Death

The real conflict begins with the rise of **Haman**, an Agagite—descendant of King Agag of the Amalekites, longtime enemies of Israel. When **Mordecai refuses to bow to him**, Haman burns with fury. But he doesn't just seek to kill Mordecai; he plots to **annihilate all the Jews** in the Persian Empire.

“There is a certain people... and their laws are diverse from all people... it is not for the king's profit to suffer them.”

*(Esther 3:8)*

Haman offers **10,000 talents of silver**—a massive bribe—to fund the genocide. Xerxes agrees and **signs the decree**.

The decree spreads like wildfire: on a fixed date, every Jew in the empire is to be killed. This wasn't just a spiritual attack. This was an existential threat to **the very bloodline of the Messiah**.

The same empire that had once **freed the Jews under Cyrus** now threatens to **wipe them out under Xerxes**.

But the Lord was already moving.

### Chapter 4: Mordecai's Plea and Esther's Turning Point

When Mordecai hears the news, he puts on sackcloth and weeps outside the palace gates. He sends word to Esther, urging her to intervene. But she hesitates—approaching the king without invitation is **a capital offense**.

Mordecai responds with one of the most powerful statements in all of Scripture:

“Who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom **for such a time as this?**”

*(Esther 4:14)*

That moment marks Esther's transformation—from passive beauty queen to **active deliverer**.

“If I perish, I perish.”

*(Esther 4:16)*

When God seems silent, **He often moves through willing vessels**. Esther becomes that vessel—not through miracles or angels, but through **courage, risk, and obedience**.

## Chapters 5–7: The Irony of Providence – Haman’s Fall

Esther devises a strategic plan. She doesn’t beg immediately. She invites Xerxes and Haman to **two banquets**. Meanwhile, **God continues working behind the scenes**.

One night, the king can’t sleep. He asks for the royal chronicles to be read (an ancient version of scrolling through old reports). The record of **Mordecai saving the king’s life** is read aloud.

Xerxes asks, “What honor did we give him?” The answer? None.

The next morning, Haman walks in—intent on requesting Mordecai’s execution. But before he can speak, the king asks him:

“What shall be done unto the man whom the king delighteth to honor?”

*(Esther 6:6)*

Thinking it’s himself, Haman offers a grand answer—robes, royal horses, public praise. The king agrees.

“Make haste, and do even so to Mordecai...”

*(Esther 6:10)*

The irony is delicious. Haman must **honor the man he hates**.

That night, at Esther’s second banquet, she reveals Haman’s plot. The king, furious, leaves the room. Haman falls on Esther’s couch, begging for mercy—only to be accused of assaulting the queen.

“Will he force the queen also before me in the house?”

*(Esther 7:8)*

And so, Haman is hanged—on the very gallows he built for Mordecai.

## Chapters 8–10: Deliverance and Celebration

Though Haman is dead, the decree still stands—it’s **the law of the Medes and Persians**, and cannot be revoked.

So the king issues a **new decree**: the Jews may now **defend themselves** on the day of the attack.

“Wherein the king granted the Jews... to stand for their life.”

*(Esther 8:11)*

And when that day comes, the Jews rise in unity and **defeat their enemies**.

What began as a decree of destruction ends in deliverance. The Jewish people are preserved—**through Persian law, through a silent God, and through unlikely heroes**.

Esther is honored. Mordecai is promoted. And the feast of **Purim** is established as a permanent reminder of God's deliverance.

### **Application: When God Seems Silent, He's Still in Control**

The Book of Esther never mentions God by name—but His fingerprints are everywhere:

- **In Esther's rise** to the throne before the crisis,
- **In the king's insomnia** at the perfect moment,
- **In the reversal of Haman's plan**, and
- **In the preservation of the Jewish people** under foreign rule.

This speaks deeply to us today.

#### **1. God's silence is not absence.**

There are seasons where God doesn't send dreams or angels. Where the sky is quiet. But Esther teaches us: **God works in whispers, coincidences, and timing**.

When God is silent, **watch more closely**—because He may be working in ways that require spiritual eyes to see.

#### **2. God places people before the problem.**

Esther didn't become queen after the decree—**she was already there**. God often prepares solutions in advance. He raises up people, opens doors, and positions His servants **before the battle ever begins**.

#### **3. God uses imperfect leaders for His perfect plan.**

Xerxes wasn't a godly king. He made rash decisions. He was easily manipulated. But even he was part of the plan. God used **Persian authority** to protect His people, just as He used Cyrus to free them.

God doesn't need righteous kings—He needs **obedient saints and sovereign timing**.

## **Devotional Reflection: Where Is God in Your Story?**

We all walk through “Esther seasons.” Times where:

- We don’t hear God’s voice,
- We don’t feel His presence,
- And we wonder if He’s still working.

But like Mordecai said—**who knows whether you are in your position for such a time as this?**

Whether it’s in your family, your job, your church, or your online influence—**you may be the Esther in someone else’s story.** You may be the one placed there to stand in the gap, to speak up, to move when no one else will.

And you don’t need a burning bush to be useful.

You just need to **be willing.**

## **Conclusion: Providence Over Power**

The story of Xerxes, Esther, and Mordecai is not just about surviving persecution—it’s about **trusting the sovereignty of God in silence.**

In a world filled with decrees, danger, and disorder, **God’s plan still unfolds**—quietly, faithfully, perfectly.

Persia was the stage. Esther was the instrument. Mordecai was the voice. Xerxes was the authority.

**But God was the author.**

He wrote a story without signing His name on every page. And yet every chapter echoes His sovereignty.

Let Esther remind us:

Even when heaven is quiet...

Even when the king signs the wrong law...

Even when your people are targeted...

**God is still writing the ending.**

## **5 of 10: Persia & Iran: From Prophecy to Power – Artaxerxes and the Rebuilders: Nehemiah, Ezra, and the Persian Favor**

*(Nehemiah 2 | Ezra 7)*

**Theme: God can open the heart of a king for His purpose.**

### **Introduction: A New Chapter, A Familiar Hand**

By the time Artaxerxes sat on the throne of Persia, the empire was already the world's most powerful. The age of Cyrus had passed, the days of Darius had brought consolidation, and the court intrigue of Xerxes had shown both Persia's vulnerability and its reach. Yet the God of Israel was not finished with this empire.

Persia remained the global power God would use not to oppress His people, but to **empower them to rebuild**. Under the reign of **Artaxerxes I**, we see the final wave of favor toward Jerusalem—the **return of Nehemiah and Ezra**, the rebuilding of the city and the reinstatement of spiritual leadership. And once again, it is a **Persian king**, foreign to Israel's covenant, who becomes an instrument of restoration.

This essay explores how God used Artaxerxes to give permission, protection, and provision to His people—how Nehemiah and Ezra carried out God's will through Persian blessing—and how this reminds us that **the heart of a king is in the hand of the Lord**.

### **The Legacy of Artaxerxes: Who Was He?**

Artaxerxes I, also known as **Artaxerxes Longimanus**, was the son of **Xerxes I** (Ahasuerus) and ruled the Persian Empire from **465–424 BC**.

In historical records, Artaxerxes is often remembered as a stabilizing ruler, marked by diplomacy and infrastructure rather than conquest. But in the biblical record, his name is associated with two towering figures: **Ezra the scribe** and **Nehemiah the governor**.

Each played a vital role in rebuilding what had been broken:

- Ezra restored **the law and worship**.
- Nehemiah rebuilt **the walls and governance**.

Both had Persian support. Both returned to Jerusalem because of **Artaxerxes' favor**.

And both demonstrate that even when the world seems ruled by kings far from the covenant, **God still governs from His throne**.

## **Ezra 7: The Scribe Sent by a King**

Ezra appears in the biblical timeline about **58 years after the events of Esther**. The Jews have returned to the land under previous decrees (Cyrus, Darius), but Jerusalem is spiritually weak. The temple is standing, but the people have compromised. There is **intermarriage, ignorance of the Law, and a lack of spiritual leadership**.

Ezra, a descendant of Aaron and a skilled scribe, is stirred by God to **bring revival through the Word**. But this revival needed royal approval. And so we find this:

“This Ezra went up from Babylon... and the king granted him all his request, according to the hand of the Lord his God upon him.”

*(Ezra 7:6)*

Ezra didn't stage a rebellion. He didn't draft an army. He made a request—and **the Persian king said yes**.

Why?

Because God had **opened the heart of Artaxerxes**.

This king, born into a pagan dynasty, **writes a decree more favorable to Israel than some kings of Israel ever gave**:

“Artaxerxes, king of kings, unto Ezra the priest... Peace. And now, I make a decree...”

*(Ezra 7:12–13)*

He authorizes Ezra to:

- Appoint judges,
- Teach the Law of God,
- Enforce obedience,
- And receive **whatever is needed from the king's treasury**.

“Whatsoever is commanded by the God of heaven, let it be diligently done...”

*(Ezra 7:23)*

What kind of Gentile king talks like this?

Only one whose heart has been stirred by the unseen hand of God.

## **Nehemiah 2: The Cupbearer With a Burden**

Thirteen years after Ezra's return, the city of Jerusalem was still vulnerable. The temple stood, but the **walls were broken** and the **gates were burned**. Without walls, the city had **no defense**, no dignity, and no secure identity.

Nehemiah, a Jew in exile, held the high position of **cupbearer** to Artaxerxes—one of the most trusted roles in the court. Though surrounded by Persian luxury, Nehemiah's heart was with Jerusalem.

“When I heard... the wall of Jerusalem also is broken down, and the gates thereof are burned... I sat down and wept, and mourned... and prayed.”

*(Nehemiah 1:3–4)*

He prays for four months, then appears before the king—risking his life by showing sorrow in the royal presence. But again, **God is already at work**.

Artaxerxes notices Nehemiah's burden and asks:

“Why is thy countenance sad...? This is nothing else but sorrow of heart.”

*(Nehemiah 2:2)*

Nehemiah responds with boldness:

“If it please the king... send me unto Judah, unto the city of my fathers' sepulchres, that I may build it.”

*(Nehemiah 2:5)*

And once again—**the Persian king says yes**.

“So it pleased the king to send me... Moreover I said unto the king...”

*(Nehemiah 2:6–7)*

Nehemiah not only asks for permission, but also **for timber, protection, and authority**—and he receives it all.

The governor of a foreign land, the cupbearer of an empire, is sent to rebuild the broken walls of God's city—**with Persian letters in hand and Persian soldiers at his side**.

## **God Uses Artaxerxes to Supply the Rebuilders**

Between Ezra and Nehemiah, Artaxerxes:

- Funds temple worship,

- Grants legal authority to a Jewish scribe,
- Sends a governor with military protection,
- And enforces the Law of God with the authority of Persia.

This was not a king who loved Israel.

This was not a king who kept the Law.

This was a king who, by divine orchestration, **honored the God of Israel more than many of Israel's own kings ever did.**

How?

Because **God can open the heart of a king for His purpose.**

### **The Spiritual Parallel: Building and Rebuilding**

Ezra and Nehemiah were both **rebuilders**:

- Ezra rebuilt **the soul of the nation** through Scripture.
- Nehemiah rebuilt **the structure of the city** through strategy.

One taught the law. The other protected it.

One stood at the pulpit. The other stood on the wall.

Both were empowered **by Persian favor**, but driven **by godly burden**.

Their partnership teaches us something essential:

- Revival requires **spiritual teaching** (Ezra).
- But it also requires **physical structure and governance** (Nehemiah).

God is not only interested in the **heart of the worshiper**, but in the **gates that protect them**. He desires a people who are both **holy and secure**, both **free and fortified**.

### **Application: God Can Open the Heart of a King**

It's easy to become discouraged when we see ungodly leaders in high places.

We ask:

- How can God's work continue under corrupt governments?

- How can revival come in a culture of compromise?
- How can broken walls be rebuilt when we're under foreign rule?

Ezra and Nehemiah answer those questions with clarity:

### **God rules over kings.**

“The king’s heart is in the hand of the Lord, as the rivers of water: He turneth it whithersoever He will.”

*(Proverbs 21:1)*

If God can:

- Move Cyrus to write a decree,
- Stir Darius to fund the temple,
- Humble Xerxes to preserve a queen,
- And soften Artaxerxes to rebuild a city...

...then He can move any president, prime minister, or governor today.

We don't need leaders to be saved for God to use them.

We need believers to **pray like Nehemiah**, and **preach like Ezra**.

### **Devotional Reflection: Burden Before the Breakthrough**

Nehemiah didn't start with blueprints. He started with **tears**.

Ezra didn't begin with power. He began with **a heart to know the Law**.

The favor of Artaxerxes was not won through manipulation or rebellion. It came **after the men of God had fasted, mourned, and sought the Lord**.

This is how heaven moves in the courts of men:

- Through the **burdened intercessor**.
- Through the **courageous reformer**.
- Through the **scribe with the Word**.
- Through the **cupbearer with a mission**.

You don't need a crown to change a city.

You need **the favor of God**, and He can place that favor **even in the hands of a Persian king**.

### **Conclusion: Persian Favor, Providential Purpose**

Artaxerxes may have seen himself as the ruler of nations, but in truth, he was **a servant in God's unfolding plan**.

He opened gates, signed letters, and released men not for his own glory—but for the sake of a people chosen by God, and for a city that would one day welcome the Son of God.

He never knew the fullness of what he was doing.

But God did.

Because every decree... every signature... every supply train from Susa to Jerusalem...

...was building a stage for the Messiah to one day walk upon.

Let us never forget:

God does not need permission from governments to move.

But sometimes, He moves *through* governments to fulfill His Word.

And when that happens, it's not the power of the throne that matters—it's the **power of the One who holds the heart of the king**.

## **6 of 10: Persia & Iran: From Prophecy to Power – Persia's Role in Daniel's Visions: The Ram and the He-Goat**

*(Daniel 8)*

**Theme: God reveals history before it happens.**

### **Introduction: Visions of the Future, Rooted in the Present**

When most people think of Daniel, they picture lion's dens, fiery furnaces, or dreams of colossal statues. But by the time we reach **Daniel chapter 8**, we are ushered into a different level of prophecy—**one that reads more like tomorrow's newspaper than yesterday's legend**. This chapter isn't symbolic fluff or mystical allegory—it's **God's precise breakdown of geopolitical power before it even unfolded**.

The key players?

**Media and Persia**—represented by a **ram with two horns**.

And **Greece**—represented by a **he-goat with a prominent horn**.

Though Daniel was living under Babylonian rule when he received this vision, the message was clear: **Babylon would fall**, and a dual empire—**Media and Persia**—would rise. But that, too, would eventually be crushed by another kingdom from the west.

To skeptics, Daniel 8 is uncomfortable. It's *too* accurate, too detailed. But to those who know the Lord, it is a reminder: **God not only controls history—He reveals it before it happens**.

This essay will explore:

- The prophetic symbols in Daniel 8,
- The historical fulfillment through Persia and Greece,
- And the sobering truth that *God does not guess—He declares*.

### **Daniel 8: Context and Setting**

“In the third year of the reign of King Belshazzar a vision appeared unto me, even unto me Daniel...”

*(Daniel 8:1)*

This vision comes during the twilight of **Babylon's reign**, about **two years after the vision of Daniel 7**. Though Babylon still sat on the throne of power, the winds of change were beginning to blow. **Belshazzar**, grandson of Nebuchadnezzar, ruled with pride, but Daniel was already being shown what was coming *next*.

He sees himself in **Shushan**, a major Persian city, though in reality he was still in Babylon. God was already turning his attention **eastward**, to the next kingdom.

### **The Ram with Two Horns: Media and Persia**

“Then I lifted up mine eyes, and saw, and, behold, there stood before the river a **ram which had two horns**: and the two horns were high; but one was higher than the other, and the higher came up last.”

*(Daniel 8:3)*

We don't need to speculate on the identity of this ram—Daniel is told plainly:

“The ram which thou sawest having two horns are the **kings of Media and Persia.**”

*(Daniel 8:20)*

**The two horns** represent the **dual kingdom** that would overthrow Babylon:

- **Media** was the initial dominant force,
- But **Persia**, rising afterward, became the stronger power—**"the higher horn that came up last."**

This perfectly fits **Cyrus the Great's rise**. Originally, the Medes and Persians were separate groups. Cyrus united them—but **Persia quickly became dominant**, absorbing the Median identity.

The **ram's actions** are described as powerful and unchallenged:

“I saw the ram pushing westward, and northward, and southward; so that no beasts might stand before him...”

*(Daniel 8:4)*

Historically, Persia expanded:

- **Westward** into Lydia and Asia Minor,
- **Northward** into Armenia and the Caucasus,
- **Southward** into Egypt and beyond.

For a time, **no one could resist Persian power.**

But that wouldn't last.

### **The He-Goat from the West: The Rise of Greece**

“And as I was considering, behold, an **he goat came from the west** on the face of the whole earth, and touched not the ground...”

*(Daniel 8:5)*

The goat is none other than **Greece**. Again, Daniel is told directly:

“And the rough goat is the **king of Grecia**: and the great horn that is between his eyes is the **first king.**”

*(Daniel 8:21)*

This refers unmistakably to **Alexander the Great.**

Note the imagery:

- The goat **flies across the earth**, “not touching the ground”—symbolizing the **speed** of his conquest.
- The **great horn** signifies a singular, dominant ruler—**Alexander** himself.

“And he came to the ram that had two horns... and ran unto him in the fury of his power.”  
(*Daniel 8:6*)

History confirms it:

- In **334 BC**, Alexander began his campaign against Persia.
- In less than a **decade**, he **defeated Darius III**, crushed the Persian empire, and established Greek supremacy.
- His military tactics, speed, and reach were **unparalleled**.

Daniel saw it **200 years before it happened**.

### **The Broken Horn and the Four Kingdoms**

“The great horn was broken; and for it came up four notable ones toward the four winds of heaven.”  
(*Daniel 8:8*)

Alexander’s reign was fast and furious—but also short. He died in **323 BC** at age 32. After his death, his empire did **not pass to a successor**, but split into **four parts**, ruled by his generals:

1. **Cassander** – ruled Macedonia and Greece,
2. **Lysimachus** – ruled Thrace and Asia Minor,
3. **Seleucus** – ruled Syria and Mesopotamia,
4. **Ptolemy** – ruled Egypt.

Again—Daniel saw it *centuries before it happened*.

“Now that being broken, whereas four stood up for it, four kingdoms shall stand up out of the nation, but not in his power.”  
(*Daniel 8:22*)

These four kingdoms **never matched the glory or unity** of Alexander's empire, just as prophesied.

### **Why Persia? Why Greece? God's Sovereign Timeline**

To the modern mind, it may seem odd that the Bible would devote so much prophecy to secular empires. But in God's timeline, **every empire is a backdrop** for His redemptive plan.

- **Babylon:** A tool of judgment for Israel's idolatry.
- **Persia:** A tool of restoration—**Cyrus and Artaxerxes** allowed rebuilding.
- **Greece:** Brought a common language, setting the stage for the **New Testament** to spread rapidly across the known world.

God doesn't just **predict empires**—He **uses them**.

And that's the point of Daniel 8:

God is **not surprised** by world history.

He is the **author of it**.

### **The Little Horn: A Dual Fulfillment?**

Later in Daniel 8, attention shifts to a "**little horn**" that arises from one of the four kingdoms:

"Out of one of them came forth a little horn, which waxed exceeding great..."

*(Daniel 8:9)*

Many scholars see this as **Antiochus Epiphanes**, a Seleucid ruler who **viciously persecuted the Jews**, desecrated the temple, and banned sacrifices.

This interpretation is solid—**historically and prophetically**. But many also see in this figure a **type of Antichrist**, someone who foreshadows the **final abomination of desolation** spoken of by Jesus (Matthew 24:15).

So Daniel 8 serves **two roles**:

1. **Immediate prophecy** about Persia and Greece.
2. **Foreshadowing** of end-time events.

This is how biblical prophecy often works—**layered fulfillments**:

- A **near-term** historical fulfillment (Antiochus),
- A **long-term** eschatological fulfillment (Antichrist).

Persia's role in this vision?

It's the **bridge between Babylon and Greece**.

A golden empire giving way to brass and then to iron.

And behind it all—**God's hand is writing history**.

### **Application: God Reveals History Before It Happens**

Let's take a moment and consider what this vision teaches us in today's chaotic world.

1. **God speaks with precision.**

Daniel's prophecy isn't vague—it names the empires, describes their traits, predicts their conquests, and even foresees their collapse.

2. **History is not random.**

Persia didn't rise by accident. Greece didn't win by luck. God was moving kings, empires, and armies to prepare the world for **the coming of Christ**.

3. **God's Word is reliable.**

If Daniel could foresee Persia's rise and Greece's fall with such accuracy, why would we doubt the rest of Scripture? Prophecies still to come—about Christ's return, the resurrection, the judgment—are just as certain.

4. **God is sovereign over the nations.**

Whether it's ancient Persia or modern Iran, the same principle holds:

“The Most High ruleth in the kingdom of men, and giveth it to whomsoever he will.” (*Daniel 4:17*)

### **Devotional Reflection: Do You Trust the Author of History?**

When you read the headlines today, what do you feel?

- Confusion?
- Fear?

- Anxiety?

What Daniel 8 offers you is something greater: **Confidence**.

Confidence that God knows what's happening.

Confidence that nothing surprises Him.

Confidence that your life is unfolding under the eyes of the One who already wrote the final chapter.

Persia rose. Greece crushed it.

Alexander rose. Alexander died.

Four generals split the world.

And through it all, **God's people were preserved**.

If He can do that for them...

He can do it for you.

### **Conclusion: The Ram, the Goat, and the God Behind It All**

Daniel's vision of the **ram and the he-goat** is more than ancient imagery—it's a **revelation of divine sovereignty**.

- Persia, in all its glory, was just a ram with two horns.

But long before CNN or global think tanks issued a word, the **Word of God spoke clearly**. In **Ezekiel 38**, the Lord outlines a confederation of countries that will attack Israel in a cataclysmic end-times war. Among these is “**Persia**,” listed specifically by name. When Ezekiel penned this prophecy, Persia was a rising empire. Today, it’s a modern nation with ancient roots, fully aligned with the enemies of Israel and actively engaged in regional dominance.

#### **The Prophecy of Ezekiel 38: Setting the Stage**

### Who is Gog? And Where Is Magog?

Before exploring Persia’s role, let’s clarify the key figures in the passage.

- **Gog:** Likely a title, like "czar" or "caliph"—a leader of a confederation.
- **Magog:** Often associated with the **northern regions**, possibly **Russia or central Asia**.
- **Meshech and Tubal:** Linked to modern **Turkey or nearby regions**.
- **Persia:** No speculation needed—**this is Iran**.

The prophet lists other nations:

- **Ethiopia (Cush)** – modern Sudan or parts of East Africa.
- **Libya (Put)** – North Africa.
- **Gomer and Togarmah** – linked to Turkey and the Caucasus region.

Together, this alliance converges against Israel.

### Persia’s Role in the Attack Against Israel

“Persia, Ethiopia, and Libya with them; all of them with shield and helmet.”  
—*Ezekiel 38:5*

Notice:

- Persia is **named first** among the allies—highlighting its **prominent role**.
- The verse implies **military readiness** (“shield and helmet”)—Persia is not a bystander; it’s a key aggressor.

Iran today fits this description **more perfectly than any other nation in that list:**

- It is **militarized**.

- It is **hostile toward Israel**.
- It is **aligned with Russia and Turkey**, just as Ezekiel said.

### **From Ancient Persia to Modern Iran**

Iran wasn't always hostile to Israel. In fact:

- Under Cyrus the Great, Persia **freed the Jews** from Babylon.
- In the 20th century, under the Shah, Iran had **friendly ties** with Israel and the West.

But in **1979**, that changed.

The **Islamic Revolution** transformed Iran into a **theocratic regime**, hostile toward the West and especially Israel. The **Ayatollah Khomeini** declared Israel the “Little Satan” and the U.S. the “Great Satan.” Since then:

- **Russia and Iran** are close military and economic allies.

Great, Persia plays a crucial role in **preserving the Jewish people, their identity, and their land**, all of which laid the groundwork for the coming Messiah.

### **Persia's Final Biblical Mentions: Ezra, Nehemiah, and Malachi**

During those 400 years, generations were born, lived, and died—never hearing a prophet, never seeing a miracle, never knowing the Messiah. But their **faithfulness** kept the flame alive.

- Keep **trusting** like Daniel.
