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## **Biblical Stewardship – Living as Faithful Stewards in a Fallen World**

### **Series Introduction**

## **1 of 10: Biblical Stewardship – The Steward and His Master**

### **Laying the Foundation of Stewardship in Scripture**

#### **Introduction: The Keys in Your Hand Are Not Yours**

Imagine someone hands you the keys to a mansion. You're told: *"Manage it. Keep it in order. Don't waste anything. The owner will return soon to check your work."* How would you live? Would you be careless, treating it like your own? Or would you guard every room with honor, knowing the true Owner is coming?

Welcome to the world of biblical stewardship.

Stewardship is not just a church buzzword. It is the core reality of the Christian life. From the Garden of Eden to the Judgment Seat of Christ, the Bible presents man as a **steward**, not an owner. We manage what belongs to Another. Our time, our talents, our resources—none of it is truly ours. It is **entrusted** to us. And one day, we will give account.

In this first essay, we'll explore what it means to be a steward in God's kingdom. We'll define the biblical term, lay a doctrinal foundation, and understand the tension between **ownership** and **management**. By the end, you'll realize this isn't just about money—it's about every heartbeat of your life.

## **I. What Is a Steward? (Genesis 39:4, 1 Corinthians 4:2)**

Let's begin with the term itself.

A **steward** in Scripture is a **household manager**—someone entrusted with overseeing what belongs to someone else. The Greek word used in the New Testament is *oikonomos*, literally meaning *"house law"* or *"one who manages a household."*

### **Joseph: The Model Steward (Genesis 39:4)**

*"And Joseph found grace in his sight, and he served him: and he made him overseer over his house, and all that he had he put into his hand."* – Genesis 39:4

Joseph was not the owner of Potiphar's estate. He didn't earn the land, the wealth, or the authority. It was **granted** to him. His job was to **manage it wisely**, with excellence and integrity.

Notice: he had access to **everything**, yet still **answers to someone**.

That's us.

### **Paul's Perspective (1 Corinthians 4:2)**

*"Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."* – 1 Corinthians 4:2

This verse cuts deep. It doesn't say a steward must be flashy, successful, or applauded. The only requirement is **faithfulness**. Not perfect results. But loyalty to the Master's instructions.

So what have *you* been given?

- Time
- Money
- Gifts
- Relationships
- Influence
- Opportunities

God is not asking you to multiply what you don't have—but to be **faithful with what you do**. And that begins with the right mindset.

## II. Ownership vs. Management: The Heart of Stewardship

Here's the biggest misconception in Christianity: *"My life is mine. My stuff is mine."*

Nope.

*"The earth is the LORD's, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein."* –  
*Psalm 24:1*

You don't own anything. Not even your next breath. You're a **manager**—not a master.

This shift in mindset changes everything.

### You Manage What God Owns

- **Your money** isn't yours—it's God's currency moving through your hands.
- **Your house** is not yours—it's a place for hospitality and ministry.
- **Your children** are not yours—they are gifts on loan from the Lord.
- **Your body** is not yours—it's the temple of the Holy Ghost (1 Corinthians 6:19-20).

Stewardship is not just what you *give* to God—it's how you *use* what already belongs to Him.

Ask yourself: If Jesus came back today, would He be pleased with how you've handled what He gave you?

This is not legalism. This is **liberation**. Once you realize God owns everything, the pressure is off. You're not living to protect your empire—you're living to advance **His kingdom**.

### **III. The Steward's Responsibilities (Luke 12:42-48)**

Jesus told a parable that breaks this wide open.

*"Who then is that faithful and wise steward, whom his lord shall make ruler over his household...?" – Luke 12:42*

In Luke 12:42–48, Jesus explains that the steward's job is to **feed the household, keep things in order, and watch for the master's return**.

Three key responsibilities emerge:

#### **1. Provision**

We are to meet the needs of others with the resources entrusted to us.

Are you feeding people spiritually, emotionally, materially—using your time, words, or finances?

#### **2. Protection**

A steward safeguards what belongs to the master. He doesn't squander or neglect it.

Are you guarding your soul? Your children? Your mind? Your schedule?

#### **3. Preparation**

A wise steward lives in readiness. The Master is returning—and that changes how you manage today.

Jesus ended the parable with a warning:

*"For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required..." – Luke 12:48*

But it also lifts us higher. It means every day matters. Every choice echoes in eternity.

### **IV. The Rewards and Risks of Stewardship (Matthew 25:14-30)**

Jesus gave another powerful stewardship parable in Matthew 25: the parable of the talents.

*“Ye are the light of the world...” – Matthew 5:14*

You are watched—by your kids, your coworkers, your spouse. Steward your influence like a bright flame in a dark world.

## Conclusion: The Steward’s Call

At the heart of stewardship is **trust**.

This is why the Bible doesn’t treat time as a casual background feature of life. Time is a **test**, a **trust**, and a **tool** in the hands of the wise. Every second reveals something about our priorities, our beliefs, and our understanding of eternity.

*“Redeeming the time, because the days are evil.” – Ephesians 5:16*

*“So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.” – Psalm 90:12*

God doesn’t just want your tithe—He wants your **time**. And like every good steward, you must learn to **manage minutes as if they’re eternal currency**—because they are.

In this essay, we’ll explore how time stewardship isn’t about productivity hacks or guilt-driven busyness. It’s about living with *purpose*, guided by God’s Word, in a world that’s addicted to distraction.

## I. The Theology of Time: A Gift, a Test, and a Shadow

## **3 of 10: Biblical Stewardship – Treasure with a Mission**

### **Handling Wealth Without Being Handled by It**

#### **Introduction: Pockets Full, Purpose Empty?**

Imagine a man standing before the Lord with a bank account full of dollars but a soul bankrupt of eternal investment. He spent his life chasing treasure, yet never truly understood its mission.

Money isn't evil. But it **is powerful**—and it either becomes a tool in God's hand or a trap in yours.

*“For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.” – Matthew 6:21*

Wealth reveals your worship. Your bank statement isn't just a financial record—it's a **spiritual mirror**. Scripture speaks of treasure not just as currency, but as a **test** of trust, a **tool** for impact, and a **thermometer** of the heart.

This essay isn't about guiltting you into giving. It's about **liberating you from the grip of mammon** and reorienting your wealth under grace—not greed, not guilt, not legalism.

Today we'll answer three key questions:

1. What does the Bible really say about money?
2. How can I steward wealth without being enslaved to it?
3. How does grace-based giving unlock the mission of treasure?

Let's open the Scriptures—and our hands.

#### **I. What Is Treasure in God's Eyes?**

When Jesus spoke about treasure, He didn't limit the term to coins or gold.

In Scripture, **treasure includes**:

- **Material wealth** (Proverbs 10:22)
- **Spiritual wisdom** (Proverbs 2:4)

### **Stewardship Begins With Ownership**

*“The earth is the LORD's, and the fulness thereof...” – Psalm 24:1*

Until you settle the **ownership issue**, you'll never get stewardship right.

**God owns everything.** You own nothing. You are a **manager**, not a master. Every dollar is a **loan** from Heaven with a purpose stamped on it.

And one day, you'll give account—not just for how you earned your money, but **why** you used it the way you did.

## **II. Dangers of Mishandled Treasure (Luke 16:11)**

Jesus doesn't shy away from the **spiritual weight of wealth**.

*“If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon, who will commit to your trust the true riches?” – Luke 16:11*

Here, “mammon” refers to **worldly wealth**. And Jesus says it's the **training ground** for greater spiritual responsibility.

### **1. Money Can Blind You to Your Need for God**

*“Because thou sayest, I am rich... and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked.” – Revelation 3:17*

Wealth is deceptive. It makes you feel in control, self-sufficient, insulated from hardship. But spiritual poverty can hide beneath luxury.

Just ask Laodicea.

## 2. Money Can Become a Master (Matthew 6:24)

*“Ye cannot serve God and mammon.”*

Jesus draws a hard line. It’s not “God and...” It’s **God or**.

Money is a tool—but when it becomes a god, it destroys. It drives compromise, stress, greed, and fear.

You know you’re enslaved to mammon when:

- You obsess over money daily.
- You fear giving or tithing.
- You compromise integrity to keep it.
- You treat generosity as optional.

Mammon isn’t neutral. It’s spiritual—and it’s **jealous**.

## 3. Money Multiplies Who You Already Are

*“A faithful man shall abound with blessings...” – Proverbs 28:20*

Money doesn’t change people—it reveals them. A selfish man with \$10 will be a selfish man with \$10,000. But a faithful steward—rich or poor—will abound in God’s blessing.

You don’t need more money to be generous. You need more **conviction** about the mission of treasure.

## III. Honoring God with Wealth (Proverbs 3:9-10)

Now to the positive. God isn’t anti-wealth. He’s anti-idolatry.

*“Honour the LORD with thy substance, and with the firstfruits of all thine increase: So shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine.” – Proverbs 3:9-10*

God wants your **first**, not your leftovers. Not because He needs it—but because He deserves it.

## 1. Honor Through Firstfruits Giving

This principle goes all the way back to Cain and Abel.

Abel gave the **firstlings** of his flock—Cain just gave *some*. God accepted Abel, but rejected Cain's offering (Genesis 4:3-5). Why? Because the **heart behind the gift** matters more than the gift itself.

- Firstfruit giving says: *"God, You're first."*
- Delayed giving says: *"God, You're optional."*

## 2. Honor Through Generosity

*"He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly..." – 2 Corinthians 9:6*

Giving is sowing. You reap in proportion to how you plant. God's economy isn't stingy—it's **supernatural**.

This doesn't mean you'll always be rich—it means your **life will overflow with spiritual reward**, peace, and purpose.

## 3. Honor Through Private Obedience

*"But when thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth..." – Matthew 6:3*

Stewardship is not showmanship. Some of the greatest givers are **quietly radical**—giving in secret, blessing without broadcast, and funding kingdom work anonymously.

God sees. God multiplies. God rewards.

## IV. Grace-Based Giving: No Guilt, Just Glory

Many Christians associate money talk with manipulation, guilt, and pressure. Sadly, many churches have contributed to that.

But **grace-based giving** is different. It's not about **duty**—it's about **delight**.

*"Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver." – 2 Corinthians 9:7*

Let's break this down.

### 1. "According as he purposeth in his heart"

Giving should be **planned**, not impulsive. It's not about emotional hype or guilt trips. It's about **intention**.

You don't need to wait for a campaign. You pray, purpose, and participate.

## 2. "Not grudgingly, or of necessity"

God doesn't want money from clenched fists. He's not honored by **begrudged obedience**.

The Old Testament tithe was a floor—not a ceiling. In the New Testament, giving flows from **freedom**, not formula.

## 3. "For God loveth a cheerful giver"

The Greek word here for "cheerful" is *hilaros*—the root of our word *hilarious*. God is delighted by giving that comes from **joyful, grace-filled hearts**.

The truth? You can't outgive God.

The man replies, "I was afraid. I didn't want to mess it up. So I hid it."

Silence.

And then the crushing reply: *"Thou wicked and slothful servant..."*

That's not a parable—it's a future **reality**.

Many believers today live like their talents are for **comfort**—not for the **kingdom**. They bury them beneath fear, excuses, distractions, or false humility. But God doesn't gift you to decorate your life—He equips you to **impact eternity**.

*"As every man hath received the gift, even so minister the same one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God." – 1 Peter 4:10*

If you're saved, you're **gifted**.

If you're gifted, you're **responsible**.

And if you're responsible, you will be **rewarded—or rebuked—accordingly**.

This essay unpacks two core truths:

1. God gives every believer a spiritual gift.
2. He expects us to use those gifts for eternal return—not earthly applause.

## I. What Are Spiritual Gifts?

Let's define terms first.

A **spiritual gift** is a **divine enablement** given by the Holy Spirit to every believer at salvation for the **edification of the body of Christ**.

## II. The Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30)

### 3. Burying a Gift Is a Spiritual Crime

Imagine saints dropping offerings into a basket, not because they “have to,” but because they **can't wait to**.

This isn't a fantasy. It's **New Testament Christianity**.

Sadly, many churches today swing to extremes when it comes to money:

- On one end: **Legalism**, where people are manipulated to tithe under fear of curses and punishment.

- On the other: **License**, where giving is optional, casual, and almost forgotten.

But there's a better way—**grace-based giving**. And when understood, it **surpasses tithing** in power, joy, and eternal impact.

This essay will:

- Refute common abuses of tithing.
- Explore the difference between law-based and grace-based giving.
- Unpack what cheerful giving looks like in the church age.

The goal? Not just to get money in the plate—but to **awaken hearts** that overflow with generosity because of what **Christ has already given**.

## I. Understanding the Tithe: What It Was—and Wasn't

Before we talk about giving under grace, we must first understand the **Old Testament tithe**.

Instead, it calls for something **higher**—not 10% under pressure, but **100% under grace**.

## II. Prosperity Preaching vs. Biblical Giving

*“Supposing that gain is godliness: from such withdraw thyself.” – 1 Timothy 6:5*

The **prosperity gospel** teaches that if you give, God owes you more in return. That your seed guarantees a harvest of wealth. That faith equals finance.

This doctrine is toxic.

### 1. It Puts the Focus on Getting, Not Giving

True biblical giving is **others-focused**—not self-enriching.

- Prosperity says: “Give to get.”
- Grace says: “Give because you’ve already received.”

### 2. It Twists Scripture to Justify Greed

Verses like Luke 6:38 and Malachi 3:10 are ripped from context to promise earthly wealth.

*“Give, and it shall be given unto you...”* is not a vending-machine formula.

*“Bring ye all the tithes...”* is under the law—not grace.

### 3. It Exploits the Poor

Jesus never said, “Give to My ministry and I’ll send you a blessing.” He said:

*“Freely ye have received, freely give.” – Matthew 10:8*

The prosperity gospel is **spiritual extortion**.

Reject it completely.

## III. Grace-Based Giving: A Higher Standard of Generosity

*“But this I say, He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully.”*

*“Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver.” – 2 Corinthians 9:6–7*

This is the **gold standard** for New Testament giving.

Let’s break it down.

### **1. “As he purposeth in his heart” – Intentional Giving**

No number is mandated. God leaves the amount to the **heart**, guided by the **Spirit**.

The word “cheerful” in Greek is *hilaros*—the root of *hilarious*.

Don't neglect the body that feeds you.

## 2. Give Beyond the Church as God Leads

God may burden you to support:

- Missionaries

## 3. Give Regularly and Sacrificially

Grace giving is not about equal **amounts**—but equal **sacrifice**.

- Self-promotion
- Shiny distractions
- Fast results

But it **never lasts**.

Every empire built without God's blueprint **crumbles**.

What profit is it to gain the whole world—and lose your reward?

##### **2. God's Return: Faithfulness, Fruit, Fellowship**

The believer who:

- Serves without recognition
- Loves without condition
- Gives without calculation
- Prays without applause

*The Ultimate Reward for a Faithful Life*

*(Matthew 25:21, Revelation 22:12)*

## **Introduction: The Applause That Matters Most (400 words)**

Every soul on this earth craves one thing, whether they know it or not: approval. Not social media likes. Not the applause of man. Not the affirmation of a boss or even family. At the end of life's journey, what the child of God yearns for most is the voice of their Master saying, "Well done."

It's the ultimate compliment. The final verdict. The echo that reverberates into eternity.

But that approval is not automatic.

It's not earned through worldly success, ministry fame, or ticking religious boxes. It comes through **faithful stewardship**—not perfection, but consistency. Not grandeur, but obedience. God isn't looking for flashy performances; He's looking for **faithfulness**. And stewardship, from start to finish, is the test of our faithfulness.

The journey of stewardship ends here. We've covered how to handle time, treasure, talents, and responsibilities under grace. But now we ask: **What's the reward?** Does it really matter? Does God notice?

Jesus answers that question directly in **Matthew 25:21**:

"His lord said unto him, Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord."

And again, in **Revelation 22:12**:

"And, behold, I come quickly; and my reward is with me, to give every man according as his work shall be."

God keeps records. Perfect ones.

Let that sink in.

This final essay in the *Biblical Stewardship* series zooms out to reveal the full picture: why our daily stewardship matters—not just now, but forever. We'll explore the nature of heavenly reward, the basis of judgment for believers, and the eternal joy set before those who stay faithful in the little things.

## **I. Faithfulness Is the Currency of Heaven (900 words)**

Jesus didn't say, "Well done, thou creative and famous servant." Nor did He commend charisma or cleverness. He highlighted *faithfulness*.

**1 Corinthians 4:2** says:

"Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."

In the parable of the talents (Matthew 25:14–30), the master gave **different amounts** to each servant—one got five talents, one got two, and one got one. **Luke 16:10** reminds us:

Ask yourself:

- Am I faithful in private?
- Am I faithful with small things?

Heaven is watching. And heaven rewards accordingly.

## **II. The Judgment Seat of Christ: What It Is—and Isn't (1,000 words)**

What you do *for the Lord*—with the right heart—is never forgotten.
