The Counterfeit Foundation – Joseph Smith and the Golden Plates

The Foundation of Any Faith

Every system has a foundation. For Christianity, it's Jesus Christ: "*For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ*" (1 Cor. 3:11). For Islam, it's Muhammad and his visions. For Jehovah's Witnesses, it's Charles Taze Russell and his Watchtower. And for the Latter-day Saints? The entire system stands or falls on a farm boy named Joseph Smith, who claimed an angel showed him golden plates buried in a hill in upstate New York.

If that foundation is rotten, the whole house collapses. *“Every plant, which my heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up”* (Matt. 15:13). Today we’re going to dig up Joseph Smith’s foundation and show it’s not just cracked—it’s counterfeit from the start.

The Boy Prophet and His Tall Tales

Joseph Smith, Jr. was born in 1805 in Sharon, Vermont, into a family steeped in superstition, treasure hunting, and folk magic. Before he ever “found” golden plates, he was already known in court records for being a “glass looker”—that is, using seer stones to con people into thinking he could locate buried treasure. That’s the character God supposedly picked to “restore” His church? Give me a break.

Smith claimed that in 1823 an angel named Moroni appeared to him and told him about golden plates hidden in a hill called Cumorah. These plates, he said, were written in “Reformed Egyptian,” a language no historian on earth has ever verified. Smith, who barely had a third-grade education, suddenly became the only man alive capable of “translating” this mystery language. Convenient, isn’t it?

But wait—it gets better. He didn’t translate them by studying. No, he dropped a rock into a hat (the same rock he’d used for treasure hunting), stuck his face inside, and dictated what would become the Book of Mormon. That’s not Bible inspiration—that’s carnival hocus-pocus.

The Angel of Light Problem

Now let’s test this story by Scripture. Paul warned: *“But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed”* (Gal. 1:8). Joseph Smith claimed an angel from heaven delivered “another testament of Jesus Christ.” That verse slams the door shut. That angel wasn’t from God—it was from hell. *“For Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light”* (2 Cor. 11:14).

Smith’s Moroni was no messenger of God; he was a satanic counterfeit. And the fact that Smith’s new gospel contradicted Paul’s gospel is all the evidence you need. According to the Bible, Joseph Smith’s revelation is cursed before it even gets out of the starting gate.

The Shifting Story of the First Vision

Even LDS historians admit Joseph Smith couldn't keep his own testimony straight. Depending on which "First Vision" account you read, he either saw an angel, two personages, Jesus alone, or Jesus with the Father. Which is it? If you can't keep your story straight about the foundational vision of your religion, you're a liar.

The Bible says: "*God is not the author of confusion*" (1 Cor. 14:33). But Smith's visions were confusion on steroids. That's the mark of a false prophet.

Golden Plates That No One Saw

Smith claimed he received golden plates weighing about 200 pounds. Somehow, this scrawny farm boy carried them miles through the woods while being chased by attackers. Not a scratch, not a dent, and he never once dropped them? Superman must've been on vacation.

Then, after "translating" them, the plates conveniently disappeared. Supposedly, the angel Moroni took them back to heaven. How tidy. Unlike the Bible—where the manuscripts were copied, preserved, and spread worldwide—Smith's golden plates vanished without a trace. In other words, no evidence.

The Bible is rooted in history and archaeology. Cities, kings, coins, cultures—it's all there. The Book of Mormon talks about massive civilizations in the Americas, yet not a single coin, artifact, or shred of archaeology backs it up. The Smithsonian Institution itself has publicly rejected the BOM as worthless for archaeology. If your holy book leaves no footprint in history, it's not history—it's fiction.

The Witnesses Who Never Witnessed

Smith produced eleven "witnesses" who supposedly saw the plates. Problem: several of them later left the Mormon church, admitting they never actually saw the plates physically—just "with the eyes of faith" or in a vision. That's not evidence, that's imagination.

Contrast that with Scripture. When Paul talks about the resurrection of Christ, he doesn't say, "We saw Him in a vision." He says He was seen of Cephas, then of the twelve, then of five hundred brethren at once (1 Cor. 15:5–6). Real witnesses, real events. Christianity isn't based on visions in a hat; it's based on historical resurrection.

The Plagiarism in the Book of Mormon

If the golden plates really were a new revelation, why does the Book of Mormon read like a bad rewrite of the King James Bible? It copies entire chapters word-for-word from the KJV—including the italicized words, which weren't in the originals but were added by translators for clarity. Why would "Reformed Egyptian" include English italics from 1611? Answer: it wouldn't. Smith simply plagiarized the KJV.

Even worse, the Book of Mormon quotes New Testament passages—centuries before Christ was born. It has people in 600 BC talking about the coming of Jesus Christ and quoting Matthew's gospel verbatim. That's not prophecy, that's sloppiness.

Contradictions With the Bible

The Bible says salvation is by grace through faith, not of works (Eph. 2:8–9). The Book of Mormon says, *"It is by grace that we are saved, after all we can do"* (2 Nephi 25:23). That's a direct contradiction. Either Christ's work was enough, or it wasn't. You can't have both.

The Bible says God is eternal and unchanging (Mal. 3:6). Mormonism teaches God was once a man who became a god, and we can do the same. That's not just heresy—that's Lucifer's lie recycled from the Garden of Eden: *"Ye shall be as gods"* (Gen. 3:5).

The Character of the "Prophet"

Christ said: *"By their fruits ye shall know them"* (Matt. 7:20). Joseph Smith was a polygamist who married at least 30 women, some as young as 14, and some already married to other men. He lied about it publicly, then practiced it privately. That's not the fruit of a prophet—that's the fruit of a con man.

When he wasn't marrying other men's wives, he was running for President of the United States and setting himself up as mayor and general in Nauvoo. He died in a gunfight after shooting three men while imprisoned for destroying a newspaper that exposed his corruption. That's not martyrdom—that's crime.

Testing the Spirit

The Bible gives us a test: *"Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world"* (1 John 4:1). Joseph

Smith fails the test. He contradicted the Bible, exalted himself, and preached another gospel.

And let's not forget Deuteronomy 18:22: "*When a prophet speaketh in the name of the LORD, if the thing follow not, nor come to pass, that is the thing which the LORD hath not spoken.*" Smith predicted Christ would return by 1891. He didn't. False prophet. Case closed.

The Real Foundation

At the end of the day, the foundation of the LDS church isn't Jesus Christ—it's Joseph Smith. And that foundation is counterfeit. Christ said: "*Whosoever heareth these sayings of mine, and doeth them, I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house upon a rock*" (Matt. 7:24). The LDS church is built on sand, and great will be the fall of it.

The Bible doesn't need golden plates, seer stones, or secret visions. It's stood the test of time for thousands of years. The Word of God is living, powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword (Heb. 4:12).

Conclusion: The Counterfeit Foundation Exposed

Joseph Smith was no prophet. He was a deceiver. His angel was no angel of God but a minister of Satan. His golden plates were no more real than a pirate's treasure map. His Book of Mormon is a clumsy counterfeit that contradicts the Bible, plagiarizes the King James, and props up a system of works-righteousness.

The LDS church can call itself "The Church of Jesus Christ" all day, but if the foundation is Joseph Smith, it's not Christianity—it's a cult built on sand.

The real Jesus Christ doesn't need a restoration. He finished the work at Calvary. He rose again. He's seated at the right hand of God. And He saves sinners who trust Him by grace through faith—not by golden plates, temples, or works.

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Another Gospel – The Book of Mormon vs. the Word of God

Introduction: God's Line in the Sand

When Paul wrote to the Galatians, he wasn't mincing words: *"But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed"* (Gal. 1:8). Then, just in case the point wasn't clear, he repeated it in verse 9. That's not Paul being polite—that's God Almighty drawing a line in the sand.

Now along comes Joseph Smith in 1830 with a brand-new "another testament of Jesus Christ." He said an angel from heaven—Moroni—handed it to him. You couldn't script a clearer fulfillment of Galatians 1:8 if you tried. An angel. Another gospel. Another book. And Paul's verdict is already stamped across the cover: *accursed*.

The Book of Mormon isn't just another book—it's another gospel. And another gospel is another road to hell. Let's stack it up against the Word of God and watch the whole house of cards collapse.

The Bible: Finished and Final

First, establish the baseline: the Bible is complete. It doesn't need Joseph Smith's appendix.

- Revelation 22:18–19 gives the warning: *"If any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book."*
- Jude 1:3 says the faith was *"once delivered unto the saints."* Not twice, not with an update, not "to be continued."

The canon is closed. The ink is dry. God said it, God preserved it, and God sealed it. So any "new scripture" automatically fails before it gets out of the gate.

The BOM's False Claim: It's Just Another Witness

The LDS like to say, "The Book of Mormon is just another witness of Jesus Christ, alongside the Bible." Sounds sweet, doesn't it? But the problem is simple: the Bible doesn't need another witness. The Bible says, *"In the mouth of two or three witnesses shall every word be established"* (2 Cor. 13:1).

Well, you've got the Old Testament and the New Testament. Two witnesses. That's enough. The Book of Mormon is a fourth wheel nobody asked for. And when that "witness" starts contradicting the others, it's not a witness—it's a false witness. Exodus 20:16 already condemned it.

Contradiction #1: Grace Plus Works

- **Book of Mormon (2 Nephi 25:23):** *“For we know that it is by grace that we are saved, after all we can do.”*
- **Bible (Ephesians 2:8–9):** *“For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast.”*

Do you see the difference? The Bible says salvation is a gift, not of works. The BOM says grace comes only *after all you can do*. That’s a flat contradiction. You can’t reconcile the two. One says faith alone, the other says faith plus effort. If you believe the BOM, Paul was wrong. If you believe Paul, the BOM is a lie.

Contradiction #2: The Nature of God

- **Book of Mormon (Mosiah 15:1–4):** claims God Himself came down and became the Son, then calls Him “the Father and the Son” rolled into one.
- **Bible (John 1:1–2, 14):** says the Word was *with* God and *was* God, showing eternal distinction and unity.

That’s not a minor theological quibble. The BOM muddies the water, confusing Father and Son, while the Bible gives clarity: *“I and my Father are one”* (John 10:30)—two Persons, one Godhead.

Contradiction #3: The Priesthood

- **Book of Mormon (Alma 13:8):** speaks of men being called to the “high priesthood” forever.
- **Bible (Hebrews 7:24):** says Christ’s priesthood is unchangeable and eternal—He alone holds it.

The BOM reintroduces a man-made priesthood system, while Hebrews says the priesthood is Christ’s alone. Somebody’s lying. Spoiler: it’s not Paul.

Contradiction #4: Baptismal Requirements

- **Book of Mormon (3 Nephi 27:20):** *“Repent... and be baptized in my name, that ye may be sanctified... that ye may stand spotless at the last day.”*
- **Bible (Titus 3:5):** *“Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost.”*

The BOM ties salvation to water baptism. The Bible ties it to the Spirit’s regenerating power by faith in Christ. One is a ritual, the other is a miracle.

Contradiction #5: Eternal Families

- **Book of Mormon (D&C 132, “Revelation on Marriage”):** teaches eternal marriage and polygamy as the path to godhood.
- **Bible (Matt. 22:30):** *“In the resurrection they neither marry, nor are given in marriage.”*

That’s not a small discrepancy—it’s a direct clash. Christ Himself flat-out denied the Mormon doctrine. If He’s the authority, the BOM is garbage.

The BOM’s Historical and Textual Problems

Plagiarism from the King James

The BOM copies whole chunks of the KJV—word for word—including italicized words that were translator additions, not original text. How does “Reformed Egyptian” carry 1611 English italics? Answer: it doesn’t. Joseph Smith had his nose in a KJV and passed it off as revelation.

New Testament in the Old Testament

The BOM has people in 600 BC quoting verses from the New Testament—word for word. That’s not prophecy—that’s plagiarism. God didn’t reveal Matthew’s words to Nephites six centuries early. That’s Smith clumsily patching in what he knew.

Archaeology Says No

The Bible’s history matches archaeology—cities, coins, cultures, inscriptions. The BOM’s civilizations—millions of people with steel swords, coins, horses, and massive battles—left no trace. Zero. Not a coin, not a chariot wheel, not a bone pile. That’s not history; it’s fiction.

The Gospel According to the Bible

Let's lay out the real thing so the counterfeit shows.

Paul's gospel: *"How that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures"* (1 Cor. 15:3–4).

That's it. Death, burial, resurrection. Received by faith, apart from works. Romans 4:5: *"But to him that worketh not, but believeth on him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness."*

Now compare that to the BOM's gospel:

- Believe
- Repent
- Be baptized
- Receive Holy Ghost
- Keep commandments
- Endure to the end
- Then, maybe, grace will cover you

That's not "good news." That's probation. That's a hamster wheel. And it's exactly what Paul condemned in Galatians: *"Are ye so foolish? having begun in the Spirit, are ye now made perfect by the flesh?"* (Gal. 3:3).

The Deceptive Strategy of Another Gospel

The devil doesn't mind you talking about Jesus—so long as it's another Jesus, wrapped in another gospel.

- Mormonism says: Jesus is the spirit-brother of Lucifer.
- Mormonism says: salvation is grace after all you can do.
- Mormonism says: the Bible isn't enough; you need Smith's plates.

That's satanic strategy: counterfeit the terminology while corrupting the truth. You can put the label "Jesus" on a false Christ all day long, but it won't save anybody.

Joseph Smith gave us the Book of Mormon the same way a five-year-old gives you an “inspired” comic book: cribbed from what he heard, patched with imagination, and bound in leather to look important. If the Bible is filet mignon, the BOM is spam in a can. And it stinks worse with every reading.

Conclusion: The Accursed Book

By Paul’s standard in Galatians 1:8–9, the verdict is simple:

- Came from an angel? Check.
- Preaches another gospel? Check.
- Contradicts the Bible? Check.

God said let it be accursed. And if the foundation is cursed, the whole LDS system is cursed with it.

The Bible is the final authority. The King James Bible stands without rival. Every other “scripture”—Quran, Watchtower, Book of Mormon—belongs in the trash heap of man-made religion.

If you want salvation, don’t trust Joseph Smith’s plates or his plagiarized fairy tales. Trust the finished work of Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, offered freely by grace through faith. That’s the gospel. Anything else is another gospel.

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Another Jesus – Spirit-Brother of Lucifer or Eternal God?

Introduction: Which Jesus Are We Talking About?

Paul nailed it in **2 Corinthians 11:4**: *“For if he that cometh preacheth another Jesus, whom we have not preached... ye might well bear with him.”*

Friend, that’s exactly what we’re dealing with here. When Mormons say, *“We believe in Jesus Christ as our Savior and Redeemer,”* the question is — which Jesus? The eternal Son of God, co-equal with the Father, or the Mormon Jesus, the spirit-brother of Lucifer who “progressed” into deity?

The name “Jesus” doesn’t guarantee you’ve got the right Man. The Hindus talk about Jesus. The Muslims talk about Jesus. The Jehovah’s Witnesses talk about Jesus. And the Mormons talk about Jesus. But they’re not talking about the same Jesus I find in my King James Bible. That means they’re talking about *another Jesus*.

The Mormon Jesus According to LDS Sources

Let’s not take my word for it. Let’s let Mormon authorities speak for themselves.

- **Gospel Principles (1981 LDS manual):** *“The first spirit born to our heavenly parents was Jesus Christ... Lucifer, also a son of Heavenly Father, was a spirit brother of Jesus.”*
- **Joseph Smith’s “Teachings of the Prophet Joseph Smith,” p. 345:** He wrote that God was once a man who became exalted, and that men can become gods in the same way.
- **Bruce R. McConkie, Mormon apostle, “Mormon Doctrine,” p. 192:** *“Christ, the Firstborn, is the eldest brother of all men and women.”*

That’s Mormon doctrine. Jesus is a created being, the eldest spirit child of Heavenly Father and Heavenly Mother, with billions of other spirit brothers and sisters — including Lucifer. In their theology, Christ didn’t eternally exist as God; He was born. He didn’t always have deity; He achieved it. He’s not the I AM — He’s just one of the boys who made it to the top.

That’s not the Jesus of the Bible. That’s another Jesus.

The Jesus of the Bible: Eternal, Co-Equal, Almighty

Open the Book and watch it shred the LDS counterfeit:

- **John 1:1–3:** *“In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him.”*
– The Word (Christ) wasn’t created; He already *was* in the beginning. Everything else was created by Him. That includes Lucifer. That alone destroys the “spirit-brother” nonsense.
- **Colossians 1:16–17:** *“For by him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible... whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers: all things were created by him, and for him: and he is*

before all things.”

– Lucifer isn’t Christ’s brother. He’s Christ’s creature.

- **John 8:58:** *“Before Abraham was, I AM.”*
– Jesus claimed the very name of Jehovah from Exodus 3:14. He didn’t say, “I became.” He said, “I AM.” Eternal. Preexistent. Self-existent.
- **Hebrews 1:8:** *“But unto the Son he saith, Thy throne, O God, is for ever and ever.”*
– The Father calls the Son *God*. Equal, eternal, sovereign.

That’s the Bible’s Jesus. Not the Mormon’s.

Lucifer: Created Angel, Not Family

What about Lucifer?

- **Ezekiel 28:14–15:** calls him *“the anointed cherub that covereth,”* created perfect until iniquity was found in him.
- **Isaiah 14:12–15:** he fell because he wanted to exalt his throne above God.

Lucifer was a cherub — a created being, not God, not eternal. To call him Christ’s brother is to drag the Son of God down to the level of His own creation. That’s blasphemy.

The Subtle Deception of “Family Language”

The LDS love to say, “We’re all spirit children of Heavenly Father. Jesus is our elder brother.” Sounds warm and fuzzy. But it’s poison wrapped in sugar.

If Jesus is just our older brother, He’s not God Almighty. He’s not the eternal Creator. He’s just one step ahead on the ladder, showing us the way. And if He’s just showing us the way, then salvation isn’t by grace through faith — it’s by imitation. “Follow big brother, do your best, keep the ordinances, and you’ll make it too.” That’s not the gospel. That’s works.

Why Another Jesus Won’t Save

Paul said it in **Galatians 1:8–9:** another gospel equals accursed. And another Jesus is at the heart of another gospel.

Think about it: if the Mormon Jesus is just a created being, then His death isn’t sufficient to save the world. The only reason the cross works is because it was God’s blood shed there

(Acts 20:28). If Jesus isn't eternal God, His blood is just martyr's blood, no different than Stephen's. Only the eternal Son's blood could wash away sin.

So if you trust the Mormon Jesus, you're trusting a false Christ who can't save you. That's not me being mean—that's Bible reality.

The Mormon Jesus is a nice guy. He's got a nice family tree. Born to heavenly parents, raised with a bunch of spirit brothers and sisters, including one who went bad (Lucifer). Then He grew up, got His deity merit badge, and now He's showing the rest of us how to do it.

That's not a Savior. That's a Boy Scout leader.

The Bible's Jesus doesn't need to show you how to become God. He *is* God, and He saves sinners who could never get there on their own.

Historical Christianity vs. Mormon Invention

For 1,800 years, the Christian church confessed Jesus Christ as eternal God, co-equal with the Father and the Spirit. The Nicene Creed, the Athanasian Creed, the writings of the early church fathers — all agreed on one thing: Christ is eternal, not created.

Then Joseph Smith rolls into town with his golden plates and says, "Surprise! Everybody's been wrong for 18 centuries. Jesus is just the elder brother, not eternal God." That's not restoration — that's innovation. And innovation in doctrine is damnation.

The Garden Lie Repackaged

Remember the first lie the devil told Eve? "*Ye shall be as gods*" (Gen. 3:5). That's the heartbeat of Mormon theology. God was once a man. You can become a god. And Jesus is the example of how to do it.

It's the same satanic sales pitch dressed in 19th-century American garb. Lucifer's lie in the Garden is the foundation of Mormonism. That's why their Jesus has to be Lucifer's brother — because in their system, they're both climbing the same ladder. One just did it better.

The Bible's Jesus: Final Authority

Contrast that with the real Christ:

- He doesn't share deity. *"Before me there was no God formed, neither shall there be after me"* (Isa. 43:10).
- He doesn't climb into godhood. He already *is* God. *"In him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily"* (Col. 2:9).
- He doesn't invite you to become a god. He offers you eternal life as His redeemed child. *"As many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God"* (John 1:12).

That's Christianity. Anything else is a knockoff.

Practical Consequences

Why does it matter? Because faith in the wrong Jesus damns the soul.

- A Muslim who believes Jesus was just a prophet is damned.
- A Jehovah's Witness who believes Jesus is Michael the Archangel is damned.
- A Mormon who believes Jesus is Lucifer's brother is damned.

It doesn't matter how moral, how sincere, or how devoted. If the Jesus you trust isn't the eternal Son of God who died for your sins and rose again, you're lost.

Conclusion: Choose Your Christ

At the end of the day, you've got two options:

1. The Jesus of the Book of Mormon — a created spirit, elder brother of Lucifer, achiever of deity.
2. The Jesus of the King James Bible — eternal God, co-equal with the Father, Creator of all, Savior of the world.

Only one can save. The other is a counterfeit.

Paul's warning stands: *"If any man preach any other gospel... let him be accursed"* (Gal. 1:9). The Mormon gospel preaches another Jesus. That means the whole system is accursed.

If you want salvation, you don't need Salt Lake City. You need Calvary. You need the eternal Son, not Joseph Smith's elder brother Jesus.

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The Priesthood Scam – Aaronic and Melchizedek Counterfeits

Introduction: The Great Priesthood Sales Pitch

If you've ever listened to Mormon missionaries, sooner or later the word "priesthood" will come up. They'll talk about the *Aaronic priesthood* that boys receive at age 12. They'll brag about the *Melchizedek priesthood* that faithful men receive later in life. They'll tell you that without these priesthoods, the authority of the church collapses. They'll tell you that Joseph Smith "restored" the lost priesthoods, without which the gospel could not be preached.

Sounds impressive. Smells religious. But it's a scam.

The Bible, especially Hebrews 7, already dealt with this nonsense. The whole system of priesthoods — Aaronic, Levitical, and otherwise — was nailed shut at Calvary. When Jesus Christ rose from the dead, He didn't leave any priesthoods for Joseph Smith to restore. He took it all Himself.

So when Mormons boast about their "priesthood authority," they're like kids bragging about having the keys to a car that doesn't exist.

What Mormonism Teaches

Let's be clear on their doctrine. According to LDS teaching:

- The **Aaronic Priesthood** is "the lesser priesthood," restored by John the Baptist to Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery in 1829. Supposedly, it gives authority to baptize and administer the sacrament.
- The **Melchizedek Priesthood** is "the higher priesthood," restored by Peter, James, and John. Supposedly, it gives authority to confer the Holy Ghost, administer ordinances, and lead the church.

Every worthy male Mormon is supposed to hold these priesthoods. Without them, no ordinances are valid and no salvation is possible.

That's the LDS system in a nutshell. Authority rests in priesthood, and priesthood rests in Joseph Smith's visions.

What the Bible Teaches

Now let's open the real Book. Hebrews 7 is the sledgehammer that crushes the whole system:

- **Hebrews 7:11:** *“If therefore perfection were by the Levitical priesthood... what further need was there that another priest should rise after the order of Melchisedec, and not be called after the order of Aaron?”*

That's the death sentence for the Aaronic priesthood. It couldn't bring perfection, so God replaced it with something better.

- **Hebrews 7:12:** *“For the priesthood being changed, there is made of necessity a change also of the law.”*

That's not restoration. That's abolition. The priesthood didn't go into storage waiting for Joseph Smith. It was changed, forever, by Christ.

- **Hebrews 7:24:** *“But this man, because he continueth ever, hath an unchangeable priesthood.”*

Christ's priesthood is unchangeable. You can't add to it. You can't share it. You can't restore it. It belongs to Him alone.

- **Hebrews 7:27:** *“Who needeth not daily, as those high priests, to offer up sacrifice, first for his own sins, and then for the people's: for this he did once, when he offered up himself.”*

One sacrifice. One High Priest. No more need for an Aaronic priesthood.

- **Hebrews 7:28:** *“For the law maketh men high priests which have infirmity; but the word of the oath, which was since the law, maketh the Son, who is consecrated for evermore.”*

Christ is consecrated forevermore. That ends the priesthood game.

The Aaronic Priesthood: Obsolete by Design

Let's get blunt. The Aaronic priesthood was tied to animal sacrifices, temple rituals, and the Mosaic Law. You want the Aaronic priesthood? Fine. Get yourself a lamb, a temple, and a Levitical genealogy. Without those, you've got nothing but hot air.

- Numbers 18 restricted the Aaronic priesthood to Aaron’s descendants. Unless Joseph Smith was secretly a Levite from the tribe of Levi (spoiler: he wasn’t), he had no business claiming it.
- The temple in Jerusalem was destroyed in 70 AD. The Aaronic priesthood went down with it.

So when Smith claimed John the Baptist gave him the Aaronic priesthood in 1829, he was claiming an authority the Bible says no longer exists. That’s fraud, plain and simple.

The Melchizedek Priesthood: Christ Alone

Mormons love to talk about the Melchizedek priesthood. They act like it’s some mysterious power you can pass down by laying on hands. But Hebrews 7 says Christ alone holds that priesthood.

Melchizedek was a type of Christ — a king and priest with no recorded genealogy, pointing to the eternal priesthood of the Son of God (Heb. 7:3).

But nowhere does Hebrews say you and I can get that priesthood. On the contrary, it says Christ’s priesthood is *unchangeable*. That means non-transferable. That means Joseph Smith couldn’t have it, Peter couldn’t pass it, and Salt Lake City can’t share it. It belongs to Christ alone.

The idea of Mormon teenagers holding the Aaronic priesthood is laughable. Picture a 12-year-old kid in a white shirt and tie, hair slicked to the side, holding “the authority of Aaron.” Meanwhile, the real Aaron had to be consecrated with oil, blood, and garments made according to God’s specifications in Exodus.

That’s like handing a toy sheriff’s badge to a kindergartner and calling him Wyatt Earp. Cute, but worthless.

And the idea of adult Mormons holding the Melchizedek priesthood is worse. Hebrews 7 says Christ alone holds it. So when Salt Lake says every faithful man can get it, they’re not distributing priesthood — they’re distributing blasphemy.

The Fruits of the Scam

Why is this important? Because the Mormon priesthood scam shifts authority away from Christ to the institution.

- Instead of “*Come boldly unto the throne of grace*” (Heb. 4:16), Mormons have to come through temple ordinances run by their “priests.”
- Instead of trusting Christ’s once-for-all sacrifice, they trust in a system of men laying hands and conferring authority.

- It exalts Joseph Smith instead of Jesus Christ.

That’s not restoration. That’s satanic counterfeiting.

Imagine walking into heaven and telling Jesus Christ, the eternal High Priest, “Don’t worry, Lord, I’ve got the priesthood too. John the Baptist gave it to Joseph Smith, and he passed it to me. We’re co-high priests now.”

Christ would laugh you right out of glory. The very thought is absurd.

Historical Christianity Knew Better

For 1,800 years, no Christian church ever claimed to hold the Aaronic or Melchizedek priesthood. Not Rome, not Constantinople, not the Reformers, not the Anabaptists.

Then Joseph Smith stumbles along in 1829 with his hat and stone and says, “Surprise! You all lost it. I got it back.” That’s not revelation. That’s arrogance.

The Real Priesthood of Believers

Here's the Bible truth: there is no priesthood hierarchy anymore. Every believer in Christ is a priest — not in Aaron's line, not in Melchizedek's order, but as part of the priesthood of believers.

- **1 Peter 2:9:** *“But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people.”*
- **Revelation 1:6:** *“And hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father.”*

That's not for an elite few. That's for every blood-bought saint.

Conclusion: Priesthood Scam Exposed

Works for Salvation – Temples, Tithes, and the Yoke of Bondage

Introduction: The Old Lie in New Packaging

Satan only has a few tricks, but he recycles them well. Back in Eden, he told Eve, *“Ye shall be as gods”* (Gen. 3:5). Then, in Galatia, he tried to tack works onto grace, and Paul blew a

gasket: *“Are ye so foolish? having begun in the Spirit, are ye now made perfect by the flesh?”* (Gal. 3:3).

Fast forward to the 1800s. Joseph Smith digs up his golden fairy tales, and what do we find? The same tired old lie: salvation comes “after all you can do” (2 Nephi 25:23). Do the ordinances, pay the tithe, go through the temple rituals, keep the commandments, endure to the end — then maybe, just maybe, you’ll make it.

That’s not good news. That’s probation. That’s bondage. And Paul already called it out as another gospel (Gal. 1:8–9).

The Mormon System of Works

Let’s lay it out plain. According to LDS teaching, salvation isn’t simply trusting Christ. It’s an elaborate system:

1. **Faith in Christ** (as defined by Joseph Smith).
2. **Repentance** (defined as abandoning sin and keeping commandments).
3. **Baptism** (by LDS authority only).
4. **Receiving the Holy Ghost** (by LDS priesthood authority).
5. **Temple ordinances** (endowments, sealings, baptisms for the dead).
6. **Tithing** (a full 10% to be considered worthy for the temple).
7. **Enduring to the end** (faithful obedience to all commandments).

Miss one? You’re out. That’s the LDS “plan of salvation.” It’s a hamster wheel that never stops turning.

The Bible’s System of Grace

Now compare that to the gospel Paul preached:

- **1 Corinthians 15:3–4:** *“How that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day.”*
- **Ephesians 2:8–9:** *“For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast.”*

- **Romans 4:5:** *“But to him that worketh not, but believeth on him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness.”*

That’s the Bible’s plan. No temples. No tithing requirements. No ordinances. Just faith in the finished work of Christ.

The Yoke of Bondage

Paul warned in **Galatians 5:1:** *“Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage.”*

The LDS system is exactly that — a yoke of bondage. They enslave their members to:

- **Temples** — buildings that Jesus never commanded, where “sacred ordinances” supposedly grant eternal marriage and exaltation. But the veil was torn in two at Calvary (Matt. 27:51). Access to God is wide open. Building a temple now is like sewing the veil back up.

- **Commandment-Keeping** — an endless list of rules. No coffee, no tea, no alcohol, no Sunday sports, no short skirts. Dress codes, dietary laws, and the weight of constant guilt. That’s not liberty. That’s Galatian legalism repackaged.

The Temple Trap

The LDS temple is the crown jewel of their works system. Ordinary meetinghouses aren’t enough. To be exalted, you must enter the temple. But the catch is, you can’t even get in without proving your worthiness:

- You must pay a full tithe.
- You must obey the Word of Wisdom (health code).
- You must sustain the prophets.
- You must live morally.
- You must interview with leaders to prove it.

Once inside, you go through bizarre rituals — handshakes, oaths, endowments, and sealing ceremonies. None of which are in the Bible. Hebrews 9 and 10 already abolished the temple system. Christ's once-for-all sacrifice ended the need for any temple priesthood. But LDS drags the veil back across and tells you salvation is locked inside their building.

That's not Christianity. That's spiritual extortion.

The Tithing Scam

The LDS church is one of the wealthiest religious institutions in the world, sitting on billions of dollars in investments. How do they fund it? By tying salvation to tithing.

Malachi 3:10 is their go-to verse: *“Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse.”* But Paul said in **2 Corinthians 9:7**: *“Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity.”*

The New Testament standard is freewill giving, not mandatory taxation. If you need a “recommend” card to enter God's house, you're in the wrong house. That's not grace, that's pay-to-play religion.

Grace After All You Can Do?

Here's the nail in the coffin:

- **Book of Mormon (2 Nephi 25:23)**: *“It is by grace that we are saved, after all we can do.”*

That one verse undoes the entire gospel. If grace comes after all you can do, it's no longer grace.

- **Romans 11:6**: *“And if by grace, then is it no more of works: otherwise grace is no more grace.”*

That's black-and-white. You can't mix grace and works. If salvation depends on what you do, it's not grace. If it depends on grace, it's not works. The Bible says one. The BOM says the other. Somebody's lying.

Imagine Paul preaching in Galatia: *“Christ died for your sins, but don't forget — you'll need to pay your temple dues, dress in white, and keep your coffee intake at zero if you want to endure to the end.”*

That's the Mormon gospel. It's not good news. It's probation. It's a parole program with Joseph Smith as the warden.

The Bible's gospel is different. Christ said, "*It is finished*" (John 19:30). Finished means finished. You don't add to finished.

The Psychological Bondage

This isn't just theology — it wrecks lives. The LDS system breeds:

- **Fear:** Am I doing enough? Will I make it?
- **Control:** Leaders demand loyalty, obedience, and money.
- **Exhaustion:** Members run themselves ragged trying to keep up.
- **Guilt:** Fail in one area, and you're told your eternal family is at risk.

That's not the peace of Christ. That's the slavery of religion.

The Gospel of Christ: Liberty, Not Bondage

Contrast that with the true gospel:

- **Romans 5:1:** *"Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ."*
- **Galatians 5:1:** *"Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free."*
- **John 8:36:** *"If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed."*

That's liberty. That's rest. That's salvation by grace through faith.

Why Works Can't Save

Works can't save for three reasons:

1. **Our works are filthy rags.** (Isa. 64:6).
2. **The law condemns, it doesn't save.** (Rom. 3:20).
3. **Christ already did the work.** (Heb. 10:12).

Trying to add works to grace is like pouring sewage into pure water. It doesn't enhance it. It corrupts it.

Conclusion: The Yoke of Bondage Exposed

Mormonism preaches salvation by works. The temples, the tithes, the ordinances, the endless checklist — it's all bondage. It's not the gospel.

The Bible preaches salvation by grace through faith. Christ's work is finished. The veil is torn. The gift is free.

Paul said it best: *"Christ is become of no effect unto you, whosoever of you are justified by the law; ye are fallen from grace"* (Gal. 5:4).

Mormonism has fallen from grace. And anyone who trusts in that system is trusting a gospel that cannot save.

So is the Mormon Church a Christian Church? Not if Christianity means salvation by grace through faith in the finished work of Christ. Mormonism is another gospel, another Jesus, and another spirit. The Bible's verdict is clear: *accursed*.

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Baptism for the Dead – Pagan Ritual in Christian Clothing

Introduction: One Verse, a Whole Religion

The LDS church loves to throw out **1 Corinthians 15:29**: *"Else what shall they do which are baptized for the dead, if the dead rise not at all? why are they then baptized for the dead?"*

There it is. One verse. And from that single text, Joseph Smith built an entire temple-based industry — genealogical databases, proxy baptisms, dead relatives dunked by the millions in temple fonts. They claim they're rescuing Grandma and Uncle Bob from eternal limbo.

But hold on. Paul didn't teach baptism for the dead. He mentioned what "they" were doing. He never said Christians should do it. You don't build doctrine on one verse ripped out of context — especially when the rest of the Bible condemns it.

Yet Mormonism did just that. They twisted Scripture into a pretzel, slapped Christian vocabulary on a pagan ritual, and told their people salvation depends on it.

Let's open the Book, dissect this thing, and expose baptism for the dead as the fraud it is.

The Mormon Doctrine

According to LDS teaching:

- Baptism is essential for salvation.
- Since many people die without baptism, proxy baptisms can be performed on their behalf.
- Living members are baptized in LDS temples for their dead ancestors.
- The dead then supposedly have the choice to accept or reject that baptism in the spirit world.

The Biblical Context of 1 Corinthians 15:29

Now, what did Paul actually mean?

The entire chapter of 1 Corinthians 15 is about the resurrection. Some in Corinth were denying the resurrection. Paul argues:

- Christ rose (vv. 3–8).
- If Christ didn't rise, our faith is vain (v. 14).
- Because Christ rose, we will rise (vv. 20–23).

Then comes verse 29: *“Else what shall they do which are baptized for the dead, if the dead rise not at all?”*

Notice: *they*, not *we*. Paul doesn't say Christians do it. He says *they* do it. Who's they? Likely some sect or group in Corinth practicing a weird ritual. Paul doesn't endorse it. He uses it as a *reductio ad absurdum* — if you deny the resurrection, why even bother with your goofy baptism-for-the-dead ritual?

In other words: “Even your own practice testifies to the reality of resurrection, so why deny it?”

That’s not approval. That’s argument.

Why Baptism for the Dead is Unbiblical

Let’s stack the whole Bible against the Mormon practice.

1. **Hebrews 9:27:** *“It is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment.”*
– Death closes the door. No second chances. No proxy rituals.
2. **Luke 16:26:** The rich man in hell begged for relief, but Abraham said, *“between us and you there is a great gulf fixed.”* No crossing over. No baptisms fixing the problem.
3. **2 Corinthians 6:2:** *“Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation.”* Not tomorrow. Not after death. Now.
4. **Ephesians 2:8–9:** Salvation is by grace through faith, not by somebody else getting dunked in water for you.
5. **Colossians 2:12:** Baptism pictures our own faith in Christ’s death and resurrection. It’s personal, not transferable.

The entire testimony of Scripture is against the LDS practice. One verse, twisted, doesn’t overturn the mountain of evidence.

Pagan Parallels

Baptism for the dead isn’t new. Pagans were doing proxy rituals long before Joseph Smith.

- Ancient Greeks practiced rituals for the dead to supposedly improve their afterlife.

It's busywork. Endless rituals in ornate buildings, giving members the illusion of helping the dead while enriching the institution. It's cult machinery disguised as Christian duty.

The Fatal Flaw: Salvation is Personal

The Bible teaches personal responsibility:

- **Ezekiel 18:20:** *"The soul that sinneth, it shall die."*
- **Romans 14:12:** *"So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God."*

Nobody can repent for you. Nobody can believe for you. Nobody can get baptized for you. Salvation is individual, not collective. The idea that you can dunk yourself in water on behalf of Aunt Susie and change her eternal destiny is absurd.

So let me get this straight. Uncle Larry dies a drunk, cussing God with his last breath. Years later, some teenager in Idaho puts on white pajamas, gets dunked in a temple, and presto — Uncle Larry has another shot at glory?

That's not gospel. That's hocus-pocus. That's as biblical as voodoo.

Paul preached Christ crucified, buried, and risen (1 Cor. 15:3–4). Joseph Smith preached genealogical paperwork and water rituals. One saves. The other enslaves.

The Money Trail

Never forget the money angle. Baptism for the dead isn't free. To enter the temple, you need a temple recommend. To get a recommend, you must pay a full tithe. No tithe, no temple. No temple, no baptism for the dead. No baptism for the dead, no exaltation.

It's a closed system: money in, rituals out. The LDS church rakes in billions while its members toil away doing endless proxy baptisms. It's spiritual slavery with a cash register at the door.

The Witness of Hebrews

Hebrews 10 shuts the whole thing down:

Practical Consequences

Conclusion: Pagan Ritual, Not Gospel

Baptism for the dead is pagan ritual dressed up in Christian clothing. It's built on a twisted reading of one verse, divorced from its context. It denies personal responsibility, undermines the sufficiency of Christ's sacrifice, and enslaves people to a temple system of works.

Paul never commanded it. Christ never instituted it. The apostles never practiced it. It is not Christian.

The gospel is clear: Christ died for our sins, was buried, and rose again. Salvation is by grace through faith in Him alone. Once you die, the door closes. Baptism won't help you. Proxy rituals won't save you.

The Mormon system is a yoke of bondage, a mockery of grace, and a scam that leads souls away from the cross.

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God Was Once a Man? – Blasphemy Against the Eternal I AM

Of all the doctrines in Mormonism, nothing tops this for sheer blasphemy: "*As man is, God once was. As God is, man may become.*" That's the famous couplet attributed to Lorenzo Snow, fifth president of the LDS church. Now, compare that to the King James Bible: "*Before me there was no God formed, neither shall there be after me*" (Isa. 43:10). That verse alone nukes the entire LDS system. But Mormonism barrels ahead anyway, teaching that God the Father used to be a man on another world, progressed, and achieved godhood.

For 150 years, Mormon prophets declared that black men could not hold the priesthood because of the curse of Cain. Brigham Young, Joseph Fielding Smith, Bruce R. McConkie—they all thundered that it was God’s eternal law. Then, in 1978, Spencer W. Kimball suddenly announced that God changed His mind.

That’s not prophecy. That’s public relations. If God is truly unchanging (Malachi 3:6), then the LDS prophets lied for 150 years. If they were right, then God lied in 1978. Either way, the whole system collapses.

The Moving Goalposts

When Mormon prophecies fail, LDS leaders don’t admit they were wrong. They move the goalposts.

- “Oh, it was fulfilled spiritually.”
- “Oh, it will happen in the millennium.”
- “Oh, the Lord delayed it for His purposes.”

That’s not prophecy. That’s excuse-making. Imagine Isaiah predicting the virgin birth, and when no child shows up, he says, “Well, it was just symbolic.” The Jews would have tossed him out.

The Bible’s Record vs. Mormon Prophets

Contrast this mess with the Bible.

- Isaiah predicted the virgin birth (Isa. 7:14). Fulfilled in Matthew 1:23.
- Micah predicted Christ would be born in Bethlehem (Mic. 5:2). Fulfilled in Matthew 2:1.
- Zechariah predicted Christ would ride into Jerusalem on a donkey (Zech. 9:9). Fulfilled in Matthew 21:5.
- Daniel predicted the exact timing of Messiah’s appearance (Dan. 9:25). Fulfilled in Luke 3.

The Bible prophets never missed once. Joseph Smith missed more times than a blind man in a dart contest.

Picture Joseph Smith in a prophecy contest with Isaiah. Isaiah predicts the virgin birth, and it happens 700 years later. Joseph predicts a temple in Independence, Missouri “this generation,” and 200 years later it’s still a parking lot. Isaiah wins. Joseph loses. End of contest.

Or picture Brigham Young lecturing about Quakers on the moon. NASA lands Apollo 11, and no Quakers show up for tea. That’s not prophecy. That’s lunacy.

Mormon Prophets Contradict Each Other

One more nail in the coffin: Mormon prophets don’t even agree with each other.

- Joseph Smith taught polygamy was commanded by God. Later LDS prophets denounced it.
- Brigham Young taught Adam was God. Later LDS prophets said he was wrong.
- Pre-1978 prophets banned blacks from priesthood. Post-1978 prophets reversed it.

The Bible says, “*God is not the author of confusion*” (1 Cor. 14:33). If Mormon prophets were hearing from God, they wouldn’t contradict each other. The fact that they do shows they’re making it up as they go.

The Danger of False Prophets

Jesus warned in Matthew 24:11, “*And many false prophets shall rise, and shall deceive many.*” Mormonism is Exhibit A. Millions follow men who failed the test of Deuteronomy 18. They’re not prophets. They’re conmen in prophet’s clothing.

Conclusion: The Case is Closed

The Mormon claim to prophets collapses under the weight of their own words.

- Joseph Smith predicted things that never happened.
- Brigham Young preached nonsense about Adam being God and Quakers on the moon.
- LDS leaders contradicted each other and backpedaled when convenient.

- Their revelations changed with politics and public pressure, not with God’s eternal truth.

By the Bible’s standard, they are false prophets. By God’s standard, they are accursed.

So is the Mormon Church a Christian Church? Not when its foundation is a string of failed prophets. Not when its leaders speak lies in God’s name. Not when its revelations collapse under scrutiny.

The verdict is clear: Mormon prophets aren’t Christian shepherds. They’re wolves.

The Temple Charade – Sacred Secrets vs. Biblical Simplicity

Introduction: Sacred or Secret?

Jesus Christ died on the cross, and at that exact moment, the veil in the temple ripped open from top to bottom (Matt. 27:51). God’s message was crystal clear: no more priesthood hierarchy, no more inner rooms, no more barriers between God and man. The way into the holiest place was now wide open through Christ’s blood (Heb. 10:19–20).

And yet, along come the Mormons, setting up temples again. But not biblical temples—pagan-styled fortresses full of secret handshakes, whispered oaths, and rituals cut-and-pasted from Freemasonry. They call them “sacred ordinances.” The Bible calls them bondage, deception, and blasphemy.

Joseph Smith’s Masonic Borrowing

In 1842, Joseph Smith was initiated into Freemasonry in Nauvoo, Illinois. Almost overnight, he rolled out the LDS temple endowment ceremony. Surprise, surprise—the handshakes, tokens, oaths, and penalties mirrored Masonic ritual almost word-for-word.

Freemasons grip and whisper passwords to advance through degrees. Smith took the same structure and slapped Bible-sounding names on it. But calling it “sacred” doesn’t make it biblical. The temple endowment was not revealed from heaven. It was plagiarized from a Masonic lodge.

What the Bible Says About Secrets

- **John 18:20:** Jesus said, *“I spake openly to the world... in secret have I said nothing.”* Christianity isn’t built on secrets.
- **Ephesians 5:11–12:** *“Have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them. For it is a shame even to speak of those things which are done of them in secret.”*
- **Matthew 27:51:** The veil was torn—no more inner circle, no more mystery club.

God’s gospel is open. Mormonism’s temple is closed, secretive, and elitist. That’s not Christianity. That’s occultism with a Christian mask.

The LDS Temple System

What do Mormons actually do in temples?

1. **Baptisms for the dead** (proxy baptisms to “save” the unsaved).
2. **Endowment ceremonies** with secret handshakes, aprons, and tokens.
3. **Celestial marriages** sealing couples for eternity.

Notice what’s missing? The cross. The blood of Christ. Preaching of the gospel. Instead, they spend their time repeating phrases, acting out rituals, and swearing oaths.

That’s not biblical worship. That’s performance.

Imagine Paul writing to Corinth: “Brethren, when you gather, be sure to wear your ceremonial aprons, give each other the secret handshake, and make sure only the elite with a temple recommend card can enter. The rest of you can pound sand.”

Ridiculous. Paul preached Christ crucified. Mormon temples preach works, rituals, and exclusivity.

The Veil Torn vs. The Veil Sewn Back Up

When Christ died, the veil tore. LDS prophets came along and stitched it right back up.

Hebrews 9:12 says Christ entered into the holy place “once for all” with His own blood. That means there’s no need for temples, priests, or sacrifices. Mormonism reverses it, putting barriers back between God and man.

It’s the ultimate insult to Calvary.

The Fruits of LDS Temples

What do temples produce?

- **Pride:** Only “worthy” members with tithing receipts and interviews can enter.
- **Fear:** Members terrified of breaking oaths.
- **Bondage:** Endless rituals for the dead.
- **Deception:** Belief that salvation comes through ordinances instead of grace.

Compare that with the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22–23): love, joy, peace, long-suffering. One produces freedom; the other produces chains.

Christianity’s Simplicity

Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 11:3, *“I fear, lest by any means... your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ.”*

The gospel is simple: Christ died for your sins, was buried, and rose again. Believe on Him and you’re saved. That’s it. No temple recommend. No oaths. No rituals. Just Christ.

Mormonism buries that simplicity under layers of secrecy. That’s corruption, not Christianity.

The Biblical Temple vs. LDS Temples

- The Old Testament temple was God’s dwelling place until Christ.
- Christ fulfilled it. *“Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up”* (John 2:19). His body was the true temple.
- The church is now God’s temple (1 Cor. 3:16).
- The believer’s body is God’s temple (1 Cor. 6:19).

No need for LDS temples. God already made His dwelling place—in His people through the Holy Ghost.

Picture Peter on Pentecost: tongues of fire fall, 3,000 saved, and Peter says, “Now let’s get to work building our temple in downtown Jerusalem, with a recommend system to keep the riffraff out.”

Absurd. The Spirit Himself was the gift. The temple wasn’t needed. Yet Mormonism clings to stone buildings instead of the living Spirit.

LDS Oaths vs. Christ’s Gospel

The temple requires oaths of secrecy. Jesus said in Matthew 5:34, “*Swear not at all.*” Paul said in Galatians 5:1, “*Stand fast... in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free.*”

Which do you believe? The Bible’s liberty or Joseph Smith’s chains?

The Eternal Marriage Scam

One of the big LDS temple draws is “celestial marriage”—being sealed for eternity. But Jesus already said in Matthew 22:30, “*In the resurrection they neither marry, nor are given in marriage, but are as the angels of God in heaven.*”

That verse alone shatters the LDS temple doctrine. No eternal marriage. No harem of wives on your own planet. Christ Himself said so.

Conclusion: The Temple Charade

The Mormon temple system is not Christianity.

- It’s Masonic ritual dressed in Bible words.
- It’s secrecy when Christ preached openly.
- It’s bondage when Christ brought freedom.
- It’s elitism when Christ tore the veil.

So is the Mormon Church a Christian Church? Not when its temples deny the cross. Not when its rituals mock the torn veil. Not when its foundation is secrecy instead of simplicity.

The Three Heavens – Celestial, Terrestrial, Telestial Confusion

Introduction: Heaven's Motel vs. Heaven's Gate

If you ask a Mormon where you'll spend eternity, don't expect a straight answer. Instead of the Bible's clear choice between heaven or hell, they've got a hotel brochure:

- The **Celestial Kingdom** (the penthouse suite for the top-tier LDS faithful).
- The **Terrestrial Kingdom** (second-floor room for "good people" who missed Mormon baptism).
- The **Telestial Kingdom** (basement room for liars, thieves, and the scum of the earth — but still with "glory").

According to them, almost everybody ends up in one of these "kingdoms of glory." Only the "sons of perdition" go to hell.

Now, compare that to Jesus Christ: "*He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him*" (John 3:36). Two roads. Two destinies. No "three-tiered celestial hotel."

Origins of the Doctrine

Where did Joseph Smith get this three-heaven mess?

In **Doctrine and Covenants 76** (1832), Smith and Sidney Rigdon claimed they had a vision. They saw three degrees of glory: Celestial, Terrestrial, and Telestial. They patched together a few verses from 1 Corinthians 15 (where Paul compares celestial and terrestrial *bodies*) and twisted them into entire kingdoms of glory.

That's classic Joseph Smith—grab a verse, yank it out of context, build a doctrine out of thin air, and call it revelation.

What the Bible Actually Says

Let's compare their three-tier heaven with the KJV Bible.

1. One Heaven for the Redeemed

- John 14:2–3: *“In my Father’s house are many mansions... I go to prepare a place for you.”* One house. One home. Not three separate kingdoms.
- Philippians 3:20: *“For our conversation is in heaven.”* Not “celestial, terrestrial, telestial,” but one heaven.
- Revelation 21:2: One New Jerusalem coming down. Not three cities.

2. One Hell for the Lost

- Matthew 25:46: *“And these shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal.”* Two destinies.
- Revelation 20:15: *“And whosoever was not found written in the book of life was cast into the lake of fire.”* That's hell, not the telestial kingdom spa.

3. Celestial vs. Terrestrial in 1 Corinthians 15

- Paul was talking about resurrection bodies, not kingdoms. Celestial (heavenly) bodies vs. terrestrial (earthly) bodies. He never said a word about eternal destinations. Smith twisted it.

Mormon heaven is like grading a class where everybody passes. The A+ students get celestial glory. The B students get terrestrial. The F students get telestial. But everyone still graduates. That's not judgment. That's universalism in a three-piece suit.

Jesus said in Matthew 7:13–14 the way to life is narrow, and few find it. Mormonism says the way to life is wide, and almost everyone makes it. Who do you believe — Jesus Christ or Joseph Smith?

The Celestial Kingdom

The Celestial Kingdom is Mormonism's highest heaven. But don't think every Mormon gets in. Nope. Only temple-worthy Mormons who've been sealed in celestial marriage and kept all the ordinances qualify.

In other words, salvation by works, with a temple keycard.

Contrast that with Ephesians 2:8–9: *“For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast.”*

Celestial glory isn’t grace. It’s a pay-to-play system.

The Terrestrial Kingdom

This is their “middle heaven,” reserved for “good people” who weren’t LDS but still lived moral lives. They say these folks will be visited by Jesus, but not dwell in His presence.

That makes no sense biblically. Jesus said in John 14:6, *“No man cometh unto the Father, but by me.”* There is no middle heaven for “pretty good” people. You either come by Christ, or you don’t come at all.

The Telestial Kingdom

This is the strangest one. Mormons teach the Telestial Kingdom is for liars, thieves, murderers, and adulterers. But after they suffer for a while, they’ll be resurrected into this “glory” — brighter than anything on earth.

Think about it: the worst criminals still get glory in Mormonism. Adolf Hitler, after his “time of suffering,” supposedly gets telestial glory.

But Jesus said in Matthew 25:41, *“Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels.”* No telestial consolation prize. Just eternal fire.

The “Sons of Perdition”

Mormons say only the “sons of perdition” — apostates who once knew the truth and rejected it — go to hell. That conveniently excludes almost everybody else. But Jesus said in John 3:18, *“He that believeth not is condemned already.”* That includes every unbeliever, not just former LDS.

The Psychological Trap

This three-heaven doctrine isn’t just bad theology. It’s a trap.

- It dulls the seriousness of hell.

- It gives unbelievers a false sense of security (“at least I’ll get telestial glory”).
- It keeps Mormons striving endlessly for the celestial kingdom, never sure if they’ve done enough.

That’s not good news. That’s a treadmill to despair.

Christianity’s Two Roads

The Bible simplifies it:

- **Eternal Life:** For those who believe in Christ (Romans 6:23).
- **Eternal Death:** For those who reject Him (John 3:36).

One way or the other. Narrow or broad. Life or destruction. That’s it.

Imagine preaching Paul’s gospel in Athens: “Men of Athens, God now commandeth all men everywhere to repent... unless, of course, you’re okay with the Telestial Kingdom. Then carry on.”

That’s not gospel preaching. That’s stand-up comedy.

Historical Christianity

For 2,000 years, the church has preached heaven and hell. No degrees of glory. No celestial-telestial charts. Augustine, Luther, Calvin, Wesley—they all agreed: saved or lost, heaven or hell. Only Joseph Smith, in the 1800s, introduced a new blueprint. That’s not restoration. That’s fabrication.

The Real Glory

The Bible talks about “glory” too.

- Romans 8:18: *“The sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us.”*
- 2 Corinthians 4:17: *“Our light affliction... worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory.”*
- Colossians 3:4: *“When Christ, who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with him in glory.”*

Notice: it's one glory, shared with Christ, for the redeemed. Not three glories graded like high school report cards.

Conclusion: Confusion or Clarity?

Mormonism turns eternity into confusion: three heavens, endless works, false security for sinners, and despair for the faithful.

The Bible gives clarity: two roads, two destinies, one Savior.

So is the Mormon Church a Christian Church? Not when it teaches lies about eternity. Not when it denies hell. Not when it builds a celestial pyramid scheme instead of preaching the cross.

The verdict is clear: confusion, not Christianity.

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Jesus and Lucifer – Brothers or Creator and Creature?

Introduction: The Blasphemy of “Brother Lucifer”

Ask a Mormon who Jesus Christ is, and you'll hear words that *sound* biblical. They'll say He's the Son of God, the Savior, the Redeemer. But scratch beneath the surface, and you'll find a poison doctrine: Jesus Christ and Lucifer are brothers, both begotten of Heavenly Father in the pre-existence, two sons who offered competing “plans of salvation.”

That's not the Jesus of the Bible. That's a cosmic soap opera dreamed up by Joseph Smith and Brigham Young. The true Jesus Christ is the eternal Word, God manifest in the flesh, the One who created all things—including Lucifer. Creator and creature, not siblings.

The LDS Teaching

Let's quote their own authorities.

- **Mormon Doctrine, Bruce R. McConkie (p. 192):** *“The devil... is a spirit son of God who was born in the morning of pre-existence. He is the spirit brother of Jesus.”*

- **Gospel Principles (official LDS manual, 1997):** *“The firstborn spirit child of Heavenly Father was Jesus Christ... Lucifer, also a son of Heavenly Father, rebelled.”*

That’s not a misquote. That’s LDS doctrine. Jesus Christ is not the eternal Creator. He’s one of many spirit-babies of Heavenly Father and his heavenly wives, with Lucifer as His brother.

What the Bible Says

Now, let’s open the KJV and see what God says about Christ and Satan.

1. Christ is Eternal, Not Created

- John 1:1–3: *“In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. All things were made by him.”*
- Colossians 1:16–17: *“By him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers.”*

Jesus created everything. If Lucifer exists, Jesus made him. That means they’re not brothers. One is Creator. The other is creature.

2. Christ is God Manifest in Flesh

- 1 Timothy 3:16: *“God was manifest in the flesh.”*
- Isaiah 9:6: *“His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father.”*

Jesus isn’t just a spirit child. He is Almighty God.

3. Lucifer is a Fallen Creature

- Ezekiel 28:13–15 describes Lucifer as a created cherub who fell by pride.
- Isaiah 14:12: *“How art thou fallen from heaven, O Lucifer, son of the morning!”*

He was created, not begotten. He fell, not exalted.

There’s no sibling rivalry here. The Bible says Jesus is Lord, and Satan is under His feet.

According to LDS teaching, the Christmas story should read: *“And lo, Mary brought forth her firstborn son, who just so happened to be the elder brother of the devil.”*

That's not the gospel. That's Saturday morning cartoon theology. The Mormon Jesus is just one son in a spirit-family drama. The Bible's Jesus is the Alpha and Omega. Lucifer doesn't sit at His family table—he burns at His judgment seat.

Why This Doctrine is Satan's Dream

Think about it. What could Satan want more than to drag Jesus down to his level? To convince men that Christ is just another created being, subject to the same Father, not the eternal Lord of glory.

That's why Paul warned in 2 Corinthians 11:4 about "*another Jesus.*" The Mormon Jesus is not the Bible's Jesus. He's a counterfeit. A downgraded Christ who shares the same family tree as the devil himself.

The Historical Church vs. Mormonism

For 1,800 years, Christians confessed the same truth:

- Nicene Creed: "*Begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father.*"
- Athanasian Creed: "*Equal to the Father as touching his Godhead.*"

Was the church wrong for 18 centuries, only for Joseph Smith to ride in on his golden plates and rewrite Christ's identity? No. The Mormon doctrine isn't restoration—it's regression into blasphemy.

Imagine Philippians 2 rewritten Mormon-style: "*Wherefore God also hath highly exalted Jesus, and given him a name which is above every name — except his brother Lucifer's, because they were equals once upon a time.*"

Ridiculous. Paul didn't preach "Brother Lucifer." He preached "*every knee shall bow... every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord.*"

The Gospel at Stake

If Jesus is just Lucifer's brother, He cannot be your Savior. Why? Because only God can pay for sin. If He's just another created being, His death on the cross is no different than mine or yours. The atonement collapses. The gospel evaporates.

That's why the Mormon Jesus can't save. He's not the eternal I AM (John 8:58). He's a fabricated sibling in a false gospel.

The Coming Judgment

Revelation 20:10 says, *“And the devil that deceived them was cast into the lake of fire... and shall be tormented day and night for ever and ever.”*

Lucifer's fate is sealed. And guess who sits on the Great White Throne? The very Christ the Mormons call his “brother.” Imagine standing there with LDS doctrine in your mouth, saying, “Lord, I thought you and the devil were siblings.” The Judge won't laugh. He'll condemn.

Conclusion: Creator vs. Creature

The Bible's verdict is simple:

- Jesus Christ is the eternal Word, God manifest in flesh, Creator of all.
- Lucifer is a fallen cherub, created and cursed, awaiting eternal fire.
- They are not brothers. They are not equals. One is the Savior. The other is the adversary.

So is the Mormon Church a Christian Church? Not when it drags Christ down to Satan's level. Not when it blasphemes His eternal deity. Not when it preaches “another Jesus.”

The Mormon Jesus is not the Bible's Jesus. And the Mormon gospel is not the Bible's gospel.

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The Pearl of Great Lies – Corrupt Additions to God's Word

Introduction: A Counterfeit Jewel

Jesus told of a merchant who sold everything to obtain the pearl of great price (Matt. 13:46). For Christians, that pearl is Christ Himself, the gospel of grace, the treasure of

salvation. For Joseph Smith and his followers, it's another book — a bundle of “scriptures” stitched together, called *The Pearl of Great Price*.

This “pearl” includes:

1. The **Book of Moses** (Smith's spin-off of Genesis).
2. The **Book of Abraham** (translated from Egyptian papyri — or so he claimed).
3. Joseph Smith's **History** (his own testimony, conveniently canonized).
4. The **Articles of Faith** (a list of Mormon doctrines).

Mormons hold it as scripture. The Bible calls it a counterfeit pearl — a shiny rock from the gutter dressed up like treasure.

The Book of Moses – Genesis According to Joseph

Smith claimed a “retranslation” of Genesis that became the *Book of Moses*.

- **Doctrinal Additions:** He inserted whole conversations into the text, turning Moses into a prophet of the “plan of salvation” identical to Mormon doctrine. Adam and Eve suddenly knew about baptism, the Holy Ghost, and Jesus Christ before the Fall. That's not inspiration — that's retroactive plagiarism.
- **The Problem:** The Bible says the gospel was revealed progressively. Paul calls the church a *mystery hid from ages* (Eph. 3:9). According to Smith, Adam was already preaching LDS baptism. That destroys dispensational truth and makes God a liar.
- **Sarcasm:** So apparently Adam stepped out of Eden, grabbed a temple recommend, and started proxy baptisms for the dead. Absurd.

The Book of Abraham – A Proven Fraud

This one is the rotten core of the Pearl. In 1835, Joseph Smith bought Egyptian papyri from a traveling showman and declared them to be the writings of Abraham. He “translated” them into what is now the *Book of Abraham*.

- **Content:** The Book of Abraham teaches pre-existence of souls, the plurality of gods, and Kolob — the star closest to God's throne. That's where Mormons get their doctrine that God was once a man who became exalted.

- **The Smoking Gun:** The papyri still exist. Egyptologists (even non-Christian ones) examined them. Verdict? They're ordinary funerary texts from the *Book of the Dead*, not Abraham's journal. Smith's translation is pure fiction.
- **Imagine:** Imagine buying a hieroglyphic poster from a gift shop and claiming it's the lost book of Enoch. That's the Book of Abraham.
- **Doctrinal Absurdity:** It teaches multiple gods. Abraham 4:1 says, "*And then the Lord said: Let us go down. And they went down at the beginning, and they, that is the Gods, organized and formed the heavens and the earth.*" Gods, plural. That's not Christianity. That's polytheism in Bible drag.

Joseph Smith's "History" – Canonizing Himself

The Pearl also includes Smith's so-called history, written to glorify himself. He canonized his "First Vision" — claiming he saw God the Father and Jesus Christ as two distinct beings.

Problem? The Bible says, "*No man hath seen God at any time*" (John 1:18). Paul said God dwells in "*light which no man can approach unto; whom no man hath seen, nor can see*" (1 Tim. 6:16). Joseph Smith says he saw Him face to face in a grove of trees. Somebody's lying — and it's not the Bible.

The Articles of Faith – Doctrinal Bombshells

The Articles of Faith sound harmless at first — belief in God, faith in Christ, repentance, baptism. But read closer:

- Article 1: God the Father and His Son are separate beings — denying the Trinity.
- Article 2: Men will be punished for their own sins, not Adam's transgression — denying original sin.
- Article 3: Through obedience to laws and ordinances, we are saved — denying grace.

These are not articles of faith. They are articles of damnation.

The Bible's Verdict on Additions

The Bible already warned about Joseph Smith's pearl:

- Proverbs 30:6: *“Add thou not unto his words, lest he reprove thee, and thou be found a liar.”*
- Revelation 22:18: *“If any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book.”*

Smith added entire books, visions, doctrines, and myths. The Bible says he’s a liar under judgment.

Imagine if I took a Superman comic, penciled in “In the beginning was Clark Kent,” and declared it scripture. That’s exactly what Joseph Smith did with the Pearl of Great Price. He grabbed papyri, twisted Genesis, glorified himself, and stapled it together. Call it what you want — it’s not a pearl. It’s costume jewelry from a flea market.

The Fruits of the Pearl

1. **Polytheism** — “as man is, God once was.”

Despite its name, the JST isn't a translation at all. Smith didn't know Greek or Hebrew. He wasn't comparing manuscripts. He simply sat with a King James Bible and rewrote verses, adding Mormon doctrine, deleting inconvenient truths, and inserting his own "revelations."

5. **Hebrews 7 – Priesthood Rewritten**

- The whole chapter dismantles priesthood systems: "*For the priesthood being changed, there is made of necessity a change also of the law*" (Heb. 7:12).
- Smith altered the text to make room for Mormon Aaronic and Melchizedek priesthoods, dragging believers back under bondage.

Imagine Paul the apostle standing over Joseph Smith's shoulder: "Joseph, what are you doing?"

Smith: "Oh, just improving your Greek, Paul. You left out some things."

Paul: “Really? Under inspiration of the Holy Ghost I forgot Mormon baptism and priesthods?”

Smith: “Exactly.”

That’s not translation. That’s lunacy.

Why Smith Needed His Own Bible

If you invent a religion, sooner or later the Bible will contradict you. Joseph Smith solved that problem by rewriting the Bible. He bent Scripture to fit Mormonism, instead of bending Mormonism to fit Scripture.

Romans 10:2 sums it up: *"For I bear them record that they have a zeal of God, but not according to knowledge."* That's the Mormon mission program in a nutshell.

The Machinery of Mormon Missions

The LDS Church boasts over 60,000 missionaries worldwide at any given time. Most are 18–20-year-old young men (expected to serve two years), with young women also "encouraged" to serve 18 months.

- They're trained in "missionary training centers" (MTCs) where they memorize sales pitches about the Book of Mormon.

5. **Second Person of the Trinity**

- Matthew 28:19: Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. One God, three Persons. That’s not three separate gods having a committee meeting. That’s one eternal God in three.

6. **Sinless, Sovereign, Savior**

- 2 Cor. 5:21: *“For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin.”* Not a polygamist. Not a sinner. The spotless Lamb.
- Revelation 1:8: *“I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the ending, saith the Lord.”* You don’t progress into Alpha and Omega. You are Alpha and Omega.

That’s the Bible’s Jesus.

Why the Difference Matters

Mormons love to play the “fruit” card: “Look at our good families, our moral living, our clean-cut kids, our sense of community.” Wonderful. The Pharisees had that too. But salvation isn’t about fruits. It’s about the **root**—who your Jesus is.

- John 8:24: *“If ye believe not that I am he, ye shall die in your sins.”*
- Acts 4:12: *“Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved.”*

Believing in the Mormon Jesus won’t save you. It’ll damn you. Because the Mormon Jesus isn’t the real Jesus.

The Emotional Hook

Here's why this matters in real life. A Mormon can look you dead in the eye and say: "I love Jesus. He's my Savior. I believe in Him." And unless you test it by Scripture, you'll nod along. But dig deeper. Ask: Which Jesus? The eternal I AM, or the spirit-brother of Lucifer? The uncreated Creator, or the exalted man?

Sincerity doesn't save. Sentiment doesn't save. Truth saves. And the truth is, the Mormon Jesus can't save anyone because he doesn't exist.

The Final Contrast

- The Mormon Jesus had a beginning.
- The Bible's Jesus is eternal.
- The Mormon Jesus is Lucifer's sibling.
- The Bible's Jesus created Lucifer.
- The Mormon Jesus "progressed."
- The Bible's Jesus is the I AM.
- The Mormon Jesus is a stepping stone.
- The Bible's Jesus is the Alpha and Omega.
- The Mormon Jesus points you to godhood.
- The Bible's Jesus points you to the cross.

Same name. Different person. One saves. The other damns.

Conclusion: Choose This Day

So is the Mormon Church a Christian church? Not if they preach another Jesus. And they do. The Bible leaves no wiggle room: "*Though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel... let him be accursed*" (Gal. 1:8). Joseph Smith and his angel Moroni delivered another gospel with another Jesus.

The choice is simple. Do you want the eternal, uncreated, crucified and risen Son of God? Or do you want a glorified man who shares DNA with the devil?

You can't have both. And you can't pretend they're the same. The Mormon Jesus is a fraud. The Bible's Jesus is Lord.

That's the final contrast. That's the nail in the coffin.

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The Only True Gospel – Salvation in Christ Alone

Introduction: Clearing the Smoke

After nineteen rounds of tearing down the Mormon scaffolding, we come to the cornerstone question: **What is the gospel?**

Not “What does Joseph Smith say?”

Not “What does the Pearl of Great Price whisper?”

Not “What does the bishop require for a temple recommend?”

But—what does the **Bible** say?

The apostle Paul didn't stutter when he defined the gospel: “*Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the scriptures*” (1 Cor. 15:3–4). That's it. That's the gospel in a nutshell.

Mormonism's False Gospel

 - Romans 4:5: *"But to him that worketh not, but believeth on him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness."*
You don't "work your way" in—you believe.
- **In Christ Alone**
 - Acts 4:12: *"Neither is there salvation in any other."* Not Joseph Smith. Not Moroni. Not a temple. Christ alone.
- **Sealed by the Spirit, Not the Temple**
 - Ephesians 1:13: *"After that ye believed, ye were sealed with that holy Spirit of promise."* No temple sealing necessary. God seals you the moment you believe.

That's the gospel. Free, full, final.

Imagine Paul preaching in Galatia: “Brethren, we believe that through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ we shall be saved, even as they... as long as you pay a full tithe, avoid coffee, and keep your garments starched and pressed.”

Or picture Jesus crying from the cross: “It is finished!—until you show your bishop your temple card.”

Ridiculous. Insulting. Heretical.

The Bible gospel is finished. The Mormon gospel is “to be continued.”

The Weight of Galatians

Paul was blunt about this mess: *“Though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you... let him be accursed”* (Gal. 1:8).

An angel from heaven? That’s Moroni.

Another gospel? That’s the Book of Mormon.

Accursed? That’s Mormonism.

You can’t sugarcoat it. God’s curse rests on anyone who preaches salvation by works—whether it’s Rome’s sacraments or Salt Lake’s temples.

The Tragedy of a False Gospel

Here’s the heartbreak. Millions of Mormons are sincere. They’re disciplined. They’re moral. They’re family-oriented. They’re zealous. And they’re lost.

- **Titus 3:5:** *“Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us.”*
Mercy, not merit.

That’s freedom. That’s salvation. That’s the gospel.

Picture the Mormon version of John 3:16: *“For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him—and pays a full tithe, attends sacrament meeting, wears garments, avoids caffeine, and performs proxy baptisms—should not perish, but have everlasting life.”*

Not exactly “good news,” is it?

The Final Appeal

Conclusion: Is the Mormon Church a Christian Church?

Twenty essays. Twenty hammer blows. Twenty rounds of pulling back the curtain and shining the light of the King James Bible on the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. And what's the verdict?

It's not a Christian church. It never was. It never will be.

The Evidence Reviewed
