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Introduction to the Acts “List of 7s” Series

Most people read the Book of Acts like a history book. They admire the miracles, quote the verses about power, and then move on without ever wringing out what the Spirit of God actually packed into every line. But the Book of Acts is not a scrapbook of apostolic memories—it is the Holy Spirit’s battlefield manual for the Church Age, loaded with doctrine, rebuke, patterns, warnings, prophecy, dispensational shifts, and spiritual landmines that will blow the legs off any shallow theology.

This series exists for one reason: **to force the reader to slow down and see what God hides in plain sight.** Every single verse in Acts contains at least seven truths—practical, doctrinal, devotional, prophetic, or corrective. That’s not exaggeration. That’s Scripture doing what it always does: **overflowing when you think it’s empty, speaking when you think it’s silent, and exposing you when you thought you were just “studying.”**

These sevens are not sermon fluff, feel-good devotionals, or commentary leftovers. They are *preachable outlines, discipleship lessons, sword-sharpening bullet points, and cross-reference highways* for anyone who actually believes the Book. A pastor can build sermons from them. A street preacher can quote them. A Bible student can grow from them. A family can use them for nightly devotions. And a seminary could teach them—if most seminaries still believed the Bible.

7 Signs of Hopeless Captivity – Acts 12:6

“And when Herod would have brought him forth, the same night Peter was sleeping between two soldiers, bound with two chains: and the keepers before the door kept the prison.”

“And they called Barnabas, Jupiter; and Paul, Mercurius, because he was the chief speaker.”

Paul and Barnabas show the integrity of true ministers—they reject human worship and point only to Christ (Acts 3:12; Revelation 19:10).

7 Faces of Religious Fury – Acts 14:19

1. Easily Swayed Crowds

– The same people who once marveled at Paul now turn on him. Public opinion is unstable and often unspiritual.

2. Jewish Opposition Still Pursuing

– Jews came from Antioch and Iconium, showing how deeply entrenched religious hostility can travel to stop the truth.

7 Marks of Resilient Ministry – Acts 14:20

1. Faithful Companionship

– “The disciples stood round about him.” Ministry is sustained by those who stand with you, even when they can't fix you.

6. **Distracted by Trends** – Always seeking something new instead of Someone eternal.

7. **Spiritually Numb** – With all their hearing, their hearts remained untouched.

7 Ways Paul Builds a Gospel Bridge – Acts 17:22

(Then Paul stood... and said, Ye men of Athens, I perceive that in all things ye are too superstitious.)

7. **The First Church in Athens Begins** – These few believers were likely the seed of a future church in a city full of idols.

A look at how Paul's departure from Athens wasn't failure, but divine redirection.

3. **New Ground for the Gospel** – Corinth was fertile with souls, though morally corrupt.

5. **City of Influence** – Corinth was a commercial hub—perfect for gospel dissemination.
6. **Following the Cloud** – Paul moved as the Spirit led, not based on comfort.
