It’s an evolving religious document that got edited, rephrased, repurposed, re-illustrated, and re-paginated based on who was paying the scribe, which god was trending in the culture, and which dynasty was in power.

And Christians are supposed to accept that as some ancient sacred text that holds “hidden truth”? Yeah, right.

But you know who did accept it? The Egyptians. And not just the average pauper on the Nile making bricks out of mud. We’re talking about the religious heavyweights: priests, kings, aristocrats—all the people who had enough money to get themselves mummified to begin with. That’s who the “Book of the Dead” was for. And we’re going to break this thing wide open—not just as a historical curiosity, not just as a pagan artifact—but as a longstanding rival gospel that God Himself judged... publicly, visibly, and decisively in the Exodus.

Let's take a look.

The Three Major Recensions: Pyramid Texts, Coffin Texts, and the Theban Book of the Dead

1. The Pyramid Texts (Old Kingdom, c. 2400 B.C.)

These are the "OG" afterlife texts, carved on the inner walls of Fifth and Sixth Dynasty pyramids. These spells weren't for the general public. Nope. They were restricted to royalty—big shots like Unas and Pepi II. The tone is elitist: "You're a god already. Just say this, and Heaven's yours." God calls it out: "The LORD hath prepared his throne in the heavens" (Psalm 103:19). In Egypt, dead kings prepared their *own* thrones—with chisels.

The Pyramid Texts are cosmic in tone—spaceships, star travel, ascending to heaven on ladders made of air, even cannibalism (yep, Spell 273–274 describes the king eating gods to gain their powers). Picture the Egyptian pharaoh as a Marvel superhero on steroids.

But once again, we see something God didn't allow: Israel never carved the Bible into pyramids. His Word was *spoken, written, and hidden in the heart*, not blasted onto limestone for some dead ruler's ego trip. A text for the living, not the dead.

2. The Coffin Texts (Middle Kingdom, c. 2100–1600 B.C.)

Eventually, the Egyptians democratized death. Enter the Coffin Texts. These are basically the Pyramid Texts rewritten for middle-class Egyptians—priests, scribes, nobles—people who weren't royal but were rich enough to afford fancy coffins. Think of it as the paperback version of the Pyramid Texts. No longer exclusive to kings, this version said, “Hey, you're a candidate for eternal life too, as long as you buy the coffin package deal.”

Like a religious Costco.

These spells got painted and carved *inside* coffins—the “poor man's sarcophagus scripture.” This was religion for the upwardly mobile.

But God doesn't democratize salvation by price point. Salvation is “without money and without price” (Isaiah 55:1). Egyptian salvation? Buy your coffin, buy your amulets, buy your spells. That doesn't sound like grace. That sounds like Catholicism with a pyramid background.

3. The Theban Recension (New Kingdom, c. 1550–50 B.C.)

This is the version you have in your PDF. The famous papyrus scrolls—illustrated, in color (for the wealthy). The Papyrus of Ani. The Papyrus of Nebseni. The Turin Papyrus. Massive, richly decorated funerary manuscripts rolling up to 78 feet long, personalized for the deceased.

This edition is the most elaborate and detailed—because Egypt had more time, more money, and more magic-obsessed priests. They added pictures, instructions, gods, door guardians, and “Negative Confessions” you're supposed to recite at the judgment scene. You name the sin, and they've got a corresponding “I did NOT do that” chant. “I have not lied.” “I have not killed.” “I have not stolen.” Sound familiar? It should. It's an anti-Decalogue—10 commandments in reverse.

Except God doesn't ask you to *declare your innocence*. The Bible says, “For all have sinned” (Romans 3:23). Egyptians say, “I have not sinned.” One is honest. One is delusion.

The Papyri: Ani, Nebseni, Turin, and the Custom Order Salvation

The most famous Book of the Dead text is from *Ani*, an Egyptian scribe whose papyrus was beautifully illustrated around 1250 B.C. It's not a generic scroll. It's a customized guide saying, "Hey, Ani, here's how you beat the gods, silence your heart, walk past fire lakes, and sit with Osiris."

Each papyrus was unique. That ought to tell you something. Salvation was a *product*—purchased, edited, and made to order. Want extra spells? Pay up. Want extra pictures? Pay the artist. Want your heart to shut up during judgment? Get a heart-scarab and tuck it over your mummy. That's literally a thing. Catholics do something similar—slap a saint's medal on your neck, stuff a rosary in your pocket, get a scapular blessed just right, and boom—you're good to go. Same system. Rituals + objects = false assurance.

But God says, "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life" (John 3:36). No amulet. No papyrus. No magic. Just faith.

Moses: The Man Born into this System

He sent His people into it, let them soak in it for 430 years, and then ripped them out with signs and wonders **that targeted Egyptian theology directly**. Everybody loves a resurrection story until it steps on their toes. Even pagans get goosebumps when someone starts talking about life after death. But mark it down: just because the Egyptians had a ritual called “resurrection” doesn’t mean it had anything to do with the **Biblical resurrection**. One is a patchwork corpse animated by magic—the other is a living Lord who said, “I AM the Resurrection, and the Life” (John 11:25). One is a dead king waiting in the shadows. The other is **Jesus Christ**, victorious over the grave.

You want to talk about resurrection? Let’s do it. Let’s talk about Osiris—the crowned corpse of Egyptian theology—and see what this “god of the dead” actually delivers.

Meet Osiris: The Original Dead Guy Deity

In Egyptian mythology, Osiris isn’t just another god. He’s the poster child for the afterlife. He’s the **king of the dead**, sitting on a throne in the underworld, waiting for people to show up with their spells, confessions, and amulets to see if they can pass judgment.

But here’s the rub: the Egyptians *never believed* Osiris literally resurrected in the way the Bible uses the word. The Egyptians turned embalming—the slowing of decay—into a substitute for resurrection. Wrap him up nice. Say the right words. Seal the soul. Et voilà—Osiris, lord of the silent land, ready to judge the living and the dead.

And no surprise—the whole Book of the Dead is built off this false premise:

“As Osiris liveth, so shall I live.”

“I am one with Osiris; I am eternal.”

Sound familiar? Islam stole it too: “There is no god but Allah, and Mohammed is his prophet.” The devil doesn’t care which mask he wears—as long as you don’t find Christ.

Osiris & the False Doctrine of “Resurrection”

For Egyptians, “resurrection” meant three things:

1. **Remain physically intact** (hence mummification).
2. **Say the right spells to awaken** (Book of the Dead).
3. **Be identified with Osiris** through ritual and moral certification.

Your body didn’t rise. It was magically animated—a spiritualized zombie king wrapped in linen and incense. You became Osiris-like—not a redeemed child of God, but a recycled soul in bondage to the grave, hoping to reach the “Field of Reeds.”

In fact, the “resurrection” was **symbolic**, not literal. They never claimed Osiris walked out of a tomb in daylight, never to die again. He stayed in the underworld. Permanently. Ruling over the dead, not over life.

Contrast that with **Jesus Christ**, whom the KJV says arose *bodily*, walked in Galilee, ate fish with His disciples, and declared, “Handle me, and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones, as ye see me have” (Luke 24:39).

One resurrection: *eternal, visible, victorious*.

One “resurrection”: *ritualistic, mystical, entombed*.

Pharaoh’s Resurrection vs Paul’s Resurrection

In 1 Corinthians 15, the Holy Spirit didn’t stutter:

“If Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain.” (1 Cor 15:14)

That’s the difference. Christianity *rises or falls* on whether Jesus literally, physically, historically got up from the dead.

Egypt didn’t care about literal resurrection. They were content with a *spiritual, symbolic* resurrection. A catwalk of the cosmos. The soul becoming a star. A prestigious immortalization in the underworld with your godly idol.

Paul called it “another gospel”—and Osiris is its earliest champion.

In fact, Egyptian theology is where apostate religion got the idea of **ritual resurrection** without actual victory over death. A vampire resurrection. A mummy resurrection. A *religious* resurrection but not a *redeeming* one.

That's the foundation of works-based religion today. Catholic mass? Repeat a ritual. Re-sacrifice Christ. Pretend you're resurrecting the Body in the Eucharist. It's still a dead, ritualistic Osiris theology with incense and Latin instead of linen bandages and hieroglyphs.

The Papyrus of Ani: Resurrection as Rehearsal

The Papyrus of Ani—which you'll remember from our last essay—is obsessed with becoming Osiris:

“I am Osiris, the scribe Ani... I have not died; I have become one with him.” (Papyrus of Ani, Plate 10)

Osiris was their template. If you wanted “immortality,” you had to become *like him*. That wasn't moral transformation. It was **identity theft**—pretend you're Osiris and hope the gods agree.

But we are called to be “conformed to the image of his Son” (Romans 8:29)—not to impersonate Christ, but to be made alive *by* Christ through the resurrection power of the Holy Ghost (Romans 6:4; Ephesians 2:5–6).

Egypt said: “You become Osiris through embalming and incantation.”

Paul said: “You are risen with Him by faith in the operation of God” (Colossians 2:12).

Big difference.

One is imitation. The other is **regeneration**.

John 11: The Death of Death

Let's go to John 11—Lazarus.

Jesus shows up. Martha says, “If thou hadst been here, my brother had not died.”

Jesus responds, “Thy brother shall rise again.”

Martha: “I know he shall rise again in the resurrection at the last day.”

Jesus: “I am the resurrection, and the life.”

Nobody in Egypt ever said that. Not Osiris. Not Isis. Not Thoth. No god of theirs was the resurrection. They could only promise ritual survival. Their “lord of life” was literally known as **Wennefer**—“The Good Being”—a corpse preserved by magic. C'mon, man.

You know what Jesus did in John 11 that Egypt could never do?

He walked into a grave *four days late* and resurrected a *specific dead man* with nothing but words.

Not embalming. Not ritual. Not recitation. Not amulets.

Just: "Lazarus, come forth."

And he did.

Why? Because **Jesus has resurrection power**, not symbolic status.

The Real Gospel vs Osiris' Good News

The Gospel of Osiris was this:

A scale weighing your heart against a feather.

That feather? That's **Ma'at**—the goddess of truth, order, justice, balance. The whole system is built on balancing your heart against a standard no human could reach. Sound familiar? It should. The modern world still uses a scale—and it's still wrong.

The Bible says: "There is none righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10).

So let's put the Judgment Hall of Osiris on trial and see how it stands up against **Romans 3–5**, the magna carta of justification by faith.

The Scales of Ma'at

Now comes the big moment: your heart is taken out and placed on a scale. On the other side? A single feather—the symbol of Ma'at.

The Negative Confession (Spell 125)

Imagine a man on trial today saying: “I deny all charges.” So what? What matters is what the Judge says.

God doesn't accept self-certified righteousness. He says:

In Egypt, your labor in the afterlife was a threat.

In Christianity, your labor **in this life** is a privilege.

Jesus doesn't hand you a figurine.

He hands you a cross.

How to Cheat the Afterlife in 3,000 Years or Less

Whether it’s karma, purgatory, paradise, Valhalla, nirvana, or reincarnation—there’s a universal awareness that man must face something beyond death, and that something requires preparation.

Ancient Egypt was obsessed with preparation. Its tombs and pyramids were advertisements of anxiety—stone sermons about eternity from a people who couldn’t describe Heaven without including canals, crop cycles, and ghostly field labor. But before you could reach even that warped paradise (the Field of Reeds), the Egyptians believed you had to **survive the voyage**. You had to master *the journey from death to the afterlife*.

This is where the famous phrase “*Coming Forth by Day*” comes in.

It’s not just a poetic title for the Book of the Dead. It’s the very heart of its strategy: the belief that the dead—if armed with the proper spells, passwords, charms, and knowledge—could emerge victorious in the daylight of the afterlife, like a sun rising from the darkness of death.

Today, we’re going to study the opening chapters (I–IV) of the Egyptian Book of the Dead—collectively known as the “Coming Forth by Day” chapters. We’ll expose the spiritual trickery, pagan tactics, and demonic strategies recommended for **safe passage** after death—and contrast them with the narrow way of Matthew 7:13–14:

“Enter ye in at the strait gate... for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction... and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it.”

Egypt built a broad, magical road to the afterlife.

Jesus built a narrow one with His blood.

Let’s expose one and walk the other.

What Does “Coming Forth by Day” Mean?

In Egyptian belief, death was not the end—it was a gateway. A perilous crossing. A journey through the night that required protection, knowledge, and cunning in order to arrive in the light. The night represented disorder, enemies, demons, barren deserts, chaos waters—and the underworld gods.

So, the ultimate goal of these early spells was simple:

What Was the “Opening of the Mouth” Ceremony?

The “Opening of the Mouth” was a funerary ritual designed to **re-activate the senses** of the dead.

The Egyptians believed, unless this ceremony was performed, the dead person couldn’t fully live in the afterlife—because they wouldn’t be able to:

- Speak
- Eat
- Breathe
- Speak with the gods

- Receive offerings

They weren't atheists. They weren't materialists.

They believed the human being had **multiple parts**, spiritual and physical. They believed there was **something that survived death**. They believed in **judgment, reward, ritual purification**, and **life beyond the grave**.

They were wrong about nearly all of it.
But they weren't dumb.

So she poisoned him with a magical serpent and offered to cure him only if he revealed that name.

When he did, she gained a portion of his divine authority.

Do you see the pattern?

Paganism believes salvation lies in the **control of divine names**.

That's why the Book of the Dead is obsessed with secret names:

- Name of the "Keeper of the Balance"
- Name of the "Opener of the Ways"
- Name of the "Devourer of Unclean Souls"

“I am innocent. Declare me righteous because I deny wrongdoing.”

But the Bible declares,

“All have sinned, and come short of the glory of God.” (*Rom 3:23*)

And that ends the trial.

Part I: The Egyptian Negative Confession — “I Am Clean Because I Say So”

Let’s summarize what the Negative Confession really is.

You stand before 42 gods. You read a script. You deny everything.

- “I have not stolen.”
- “I have not slain men.”
- “I have not blasphemed.”
- “I have not slain sacred cattle.”

You repeat that 42 times.

The entire premise is:

“I’m innocent because I am willing to SAY I’m innocent.”

This is not confession before a Judge.

That’s why he invents reasons not to fear death.

But Christ didn't come to help you cope with death.

He came to **destroy it**.

“That through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil.”
(*Heb 2:14*)

If you face death without Christ —
you face it without a shield.

That's not a journey.

That's a judgment.

Part V: Death With Christ — The End of Labor, The Beginning of Glory

You ever notice that Christians who walk with God *don't fear death*?

Paul didn't.

Peter didn't.

Stephen didn't.

Polycarp didn't.

You don't need their book to fall apart for them to get saved — you just need to show them the One who already tore the veil.

Let's break down the real evangelism angle for people who follow, quote, or romanticize the *Book of the Dead*.

Part I: You're Not Dealing with Atheists — You're Dealing with Deceived Worshippers

People who read and love this book are not materialists. They're not evolutionists. They believe in the supernatural. They believe in gods, judgment, rituals, souls, and the afterlife.
