This series exists for those believers.

That does not mean everyone is required to read it. Nor does it mean everyone is ready for it. Scripture never demands uniform depth at every stage of growth. Jesus Himself spoke in parables to the multitudes and explanations to the disciples. He did not apologize for that distinction. He said plainly, “Unto you it is given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God: but to others in parables” (Luke 8:10). Readiness matters. Discernment matters. Timing matters.

This introduction is therefore both an invitation and a disclaimer.

If you are a new believer, or if your faith is still forming, or if you find yourself easily unsettled by discussions of systems, deception, and spiritual rebellion, there is no shame in stepping back. This series will still be here when you are ready. Strong Meat is not about pride. It is about preparation. The Bible warns against running before learning to walk. But if you are among those who sense there are **patterns beneath the surface**, repetitions across history, echoes of ancient rebellion dressed in modern language, then this series is written for you.

The Bible teaches that the Holy Spirit is not merely a comforter, but a guide. Jesus promised, “When he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth” (John 16:13). 1 of 10 – The Black Cube and Saturn Worship: The Shadow of the Cube and the God of Time

Introduction

There is a reason the Bible opens with a God who creates light before He creates clocks, days before calendars, and eternity before history. From the very first verse, Scripture establishes that time is not a god, not a force, and not an authority. "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth" (Genesis 1:1). Time begins because God wills it to begin, not because time rules Him. Every counterfeit system that has ever enslaved mankind has attacked that truth, because once you convince a man that time owns him, you have already placed a chain around his neck. Saturn worship, in all its ancient and modern forms, is not about astronomy or mythology first. It is about **control through limitation**, and limitation always begins with time.

From the days of Babel to the marble streets of Rome, the same spiritual architecture has been rebuilt again and again, each time dressed in new language, new gods, and new empires. Scripture makes this clear when it says, “The thing that hath been, it is that which shall be; and that which is done is that which shall be done: and there is no new thing under the sun” (Ecclesiastes 1:9). What changes are the masks, not the system. What evolves is the packaging, not the rebellion.

Saturn worship does not begin as mythology. It begins as **authority divorced from God**. It manifests wherever men attempt to centralize power, control populations, and secure permanence apart from divine submission. The black cube, appearing again and again throughout history, functions as an architectural sermon. It preaches order without righteousness, permanence without truth, and unity without obedience. It tells men that stability comes from structure rather than submission to the Creator.

This essay traces that continuity. Not through speculation, but through Scripture and history aligned properly. Babel was not an accident. Babylon was not a coincidence. Rome was not a departure. Each was a continuation. Nimrod was not merely a tyrant but a prototype. The rebellion learned how to survive judgment by migrating, adapting, and hiding in plain sight. Understanding this continuity is essential, not to inspire fear, but to cultivate discernment. You cannot recognize the counterfeit unless you know how long it has been circulating.

Chapter 1 – Babel: The First Centralized Rebellion

The rebellion at Babel was not merely about language or construction. It was about **authority**. “And they said, Go to, let us build us a city and a tower, whose top may reach unto heaven; and let us make us a name” (Genesis 11:4). That single verse exposes the entire agenda. Babel was an attempt to centralize humanity under a single system, independent of God’s command to spread and replenish the earth. It was unity without obedience, progress without permission.

God had already established boundaries. “Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth” (Genesis 9:1). Babel rejected dispersion and embraced consolidation. That same instinct drives every empire that follows. The tower itself was not the primary sin. The mindset was. Man decided to secure permanence through architecture rather than submission. The tower symbolized a desire to transcend judgment and bypass accountability.

Nimrod emerges as the first king associated with this rebellion. “And Cush begat Nimrod: he began to be a mighty one in the earth” (Genesis 10:8). The word “mighty” here carries the sense of dominance and authority, not righteousness. Nimrod was not merely strong; he was influential. He built systems. “And the beginning of his kingdom was Babel” (Genesis 10:10). That phrase matters. Babel was not just a city. It was a model.

God’s response was not destruction but disruption. He confused languages, fractured unity, and forced dispersion. “So the LORD scattered them abroad from thence upon the face of all the earth” (Genesis 11:8). But the system itself was not destroyed. It was **exported**. Babel became the blueprint for every centralized rebellion that followed.

Chapter 2 – Babylon: The Mother System Expands

Babylon is not simply Babel rebuilt. It is Babel **perfected**. The city becomes both a political power and a religious hub. Scripture consistently presents Babylon as a symbol of defiance, luxury, and spiritual corruption. “Babylon hath been a golden cup in the LORD’S hand, that made all the earth drunken” (Jeremiah 51:7). That drunkenness is not literal. It is ideological.

Babylon absorbed the fragmented pieces of Babel and reassembled them into a sustainable empire. Gods were renamed. Rituals were formalized. Power was centralized. The rebellion learned from judgment. Instead of openly defying God, Babylon cloaked its defiance in culture, commerce, and religion. This is the first time rebellion learns to survive long-term.

Saturn worship finds fertile ground here. The god of time, cycles, and decay fits perfectly into an empire obsessed with permanence. Babylonian religion emphasized cosmic order, astrological cycles, and divine kingship. Time itself became sacred. Control was framed as destiny. The people were taught that the system was inevitable and eternal.

The Bible exposes this illusion. “Babylon is suddenly fallen and destroyed” (Jeremiah 51:8). No system is permanent. Babylon’s greatness was real, but temporary. The rebellion could not escape divine judgment. Yet again, the system survived by migration. Babylon fell politically, but its **ideas** did not die.

Chapter 3 – Phoenicia and Carthage: Commerce as Control

When Babylon’s political dominance waned, the rebellion shifted strategies. Power moved from land-based empires to maritime commerce. Phoenicia and later Carthage became the new carriers of the system. Trade replaced conquest. Influence replaced occupation. Control became economic.

Carthage, founded by Phoenician settlers, inherited Babylon’s religious framework and intensified its darkest elements. Saturn worship here becomes explicit and brutal. Child sacrifice to Saturn, known as Baal Hammon, was documented even by secular historians. This was not superstition. It was theology expressed through power. Saturn devours his children, and the system demands sacrifice to sustain itself.

Scripture consistently condemns this form of worship. “They sacrificed their sons and their daughters unto devils” (Psalm 106:37). The rebellion always demands blood. It feeds on generations. The black cube symbolism aligns perfectly here as a structure of containment and offering. It represents submission to a system that values continuity over compassion.

Carthage’s defeat by Rome did not end the system. It transferred it. Rome absorbed Carthage’s infrastructure, commerce, and religious ideas. The rebellion learned again. When defeated militarily, it simply merges.

Chapter 4 – Rome: The System Institutionalized

Rome did not invent Saturn worship. It inherited it. The Roman god Saturn was openly celebrated, even honored through festivals like Saturnalia. What made Rome different was scale. Rome institutionalized rebellion. Law, architecture, military, and religion were unified under a single imperial identity.

Rome's architecture emphasized permanence. Stone, arches, squares, and enclosed forms dominated. The cube emerges not as a literal idol but as a governing principle. Stability. Uniformity. Control. Rome presented itself as eternal. "Roma Aeterna." The eternal city. A lie spoken boldly enough to be believed.

Scripture warns against this illusion. "The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord" (Revelation 11:15). Rome's claim to eternity was always false. Yet its system proved resilient. Even when Rome "fell," its structures survived through religion, law, and governance.

Saturn worship in Rome was subtle. It existed beneath layers of gods, philosophies, and civic rituals. Time, order, and authority were deified. Citizens were trained to submit to the system as sacred. This is how rebellion survives centuries. Not through chaos, but through **organization**.

Chapter 5 – Nimrod as a Prototype, Not a Villain

One of the greatest mistakes believers make is turning Nimrod into a caricature. Scripture does not present him as a demon or a myth. It presents him as a **type**. Nimrod represents the first successful attempt to centralize power apart from God. That model is what matters.

The Bible does not dwell on Nimrod's personality. It focuses on his kingdom. "The beginning of his kingdom was Babel" (Genesis 10:10). That tells us the system mattered more than the man. Every later empire follows the same pattern. Leadership changes. Structure remains.

This is why Scripture warns against focusing on individuals rather than systems. "We wrestle not against flesh and blood" (Ephesians 6:12). The rebellion is spiritual before it is political. Nimrod was simply the first to operationalize it.

Understanding Nimrod as a prototype prevents distraction. The enemy wants believers chasing names and faces. God wants discernment of patterns. The black cube is not Nimrod's invention. It is rebellion's visual language.

Chapter 6 – Architecture as Theology

Buildings preach sermons. Cities teach doctrine. Architecture is never neutral. From Babel's tower to Rome's forums, structure communicates worldview. The cube represents control, containment, and permanence. It says the system is closed and unchangeable.
